It's time to make the Central Coast a stand-alone region

Federal Liberal Member for Robertson is renewing calls to make the Central Coast a stand-alone region with Gosford as its capital city.

"It's time," said Ms Wicks. "The Central Coast needs to be declared a stand-alone region with Gosford as its capital city, not as part of the Greater Sydney, Newcastle or Hunter regions," Ms Wicks said.

Ms Wicks, who has been lobbying the NSW Government for the region change for over 12 months, said the extended COVID-19 lockdown has highlighted the need for the Central Coast region to be excluded from the Greater Sydney catchment definition.

"Central Coast businesses are suffering under this extended lockdown and while I applaud the NSW Government for prioritising lives and keeping people safe, it has really highlighted the challenges of being lumped in with Greater Sydney," Ms Wicks said.

The Federal Member for Robertson said she has previously lobbied her Liberal colleagues over the issue.

"I met with NSW representatives about this issue in August 2020 and held a stakeholder roundtable in September last year and the case for us being a stand-alone region has only strengthened since then," she said.

"The Central Coast has a unique identity, Ms Wicks said. "We are now one Central Coast Council and home to over 340,000 residents, a population larger than Wollongong, Geelong and Hobart.

"I have faith that the Premier can require the NSW Government to agree to a common definition for the Central Coast and declare Gosford as our capital city and I am calling on the state government to do so."

"By having a consistent definition, government policies can be more effectively implemented in the region, as well as giving certainty to Central Coast residents and businesses who have been confused as to whether they are eligible for government programs and why they are being lumped like greater Sydney.

MANGROVE MOUNTAIN UNION CHURCH UPDATE

Since the announcement by the committee in charge at the time that they intended to sell the church, the community has been working feverishly to prevent the sale and keep the church in the hands of local residents.

The ownership and management of the church was set up as a trust where the trustees and in a later form, the committee, held the property in trust for the residents of the district.

In a long standing process, the trustees and committee members, over time, due to various reasons, vacated their positions and were succeeded by other members of the community.

In an unprecedented move, the committee decided, with a vote of 3 to 1, not to transfer management to others but instead to sell the property.

The group of people who attended services ministered by Uniting Church ministers were and are opposed to the sale and were further disappointed when the committee stopped opening the church forcing the group to hold services in the carpark area.

As a consequence, the group decided that the three committee members who advocated the sale were to be disendorsed as representative members of the group and were no longer approved by the group for membership of the MMUC Association. Under the

Ms Wicks said that with a new region and capitol city status government departments could relocate to the Gosford, providing more jobs for locals.

"I want to thank the Central Coast Community for all they are doing to comply with the NSW health orders but this lockdown has highlighted the frustration that many Central Coast residents feel when we are overlooked as an individual region with its own capital city.

"I will not stop fighting for this change because it's past time that the Central Coast becomes a region in its own right."

constitution, these three persons are now not eligible to be on the committee of the MMUC Association.

Subsequently, in accordance with the constitution, eight new persons have been appointed as members of the MMUC Association.

To add to the mix, the Uniting Church had provided notice that the Mangrove Mountain Congregation would be dissolved on 30/6/21. As a result, the group of persons who had been attending the services at the MMUC decided to form into an Incorporated Association to be known as the Mangrove Mountain Christian Group with the intention of continuing to hold Christian services at the MMUC.

Investigations have shown clearly that the reasons for the sale put forward by the previous committee are not valid. There were no real financial problems identified, there was ample help on offer for maintenence and operational activities, the buildings are in good condition and there is absolutely no legal imperative to sell the property.

The actions of the three dis-endorsed committee members have been called into question as well as their appointment of a liquidator. With no debt and no question of solvency, there is great difficulty in understanding why a liquidator would be appointed.

The Mangrove Mountain Christian Group has engaged a solicitor to assist in dealing with the liquidator and the NSW Department of Fair Trading.

Through all that has eventuated, despite the community support and the appointment of new members to the MMUC Association the previous committee members continue to push for the sale of the church. The reasons for this are unfathomable and have led to a great deal of speculation.

Believers that Beggar Belief

In 2016 the President of the Union Church Committee put it on record that the church was a community asset, built by and for the community. In 2021 the committee is telling that same community that the church is not a community asset, it belongs to them as officers of an association constituted exclusively of local Christian groups, and will be sold regardless.

It is either an asset that belongs to the community or it is not. So which of their statements is a lie? If they believe both statements are true, perhaps it is true that belief trumps reason and they, as believers, have no charge to answer.

While on the subject of Mysterious Ways, it is interesting how commonly held places hold a community together and tie us to our heritage. They often can, in the case of objects and buildings, provide tangible doorways to our knowing more about ourselves. A mystery indeed.

To take a case in point, the move to have the Union Church and grounds made a war memorial. What do we know about Richard Le Gray whose name appears on a plaque once affixed to the Union Church? Do we know how he died in WW1? Why is it that only he and William Jamieson were commemorated in this way, when many others died? And what does this tell us about the Mangrove Mountain/Cootamundra connection?

We do know that many settlers in the Mountain Districts came here from Cootamundra, and that "seven Cootamundrians enlisted from the district: E. Haslam, W. Lindsay, P. Solling, H.J. Gates, Athol Kelynack, V. J. Pinkstone (killed), and H. Le Gray (killed)". This is from the Cootamundra Herald, owned by Fred Pinkstone senior, another of

whose son's, Norman, farmed on the Mountain and was at Lone Pine with his brother Vic Pinkstone when he died.

Charles Richard (Dick) Hubert Le Gray was born in Cootamundra, his father was George Charles Gray from Switzerland and his mother was Edith Esme Leonore Schonfeldt, aka Edith Gray, Esme Le Gray, Blanch E.E. Le Gray, Mrs Blanch Edith Bissaker, and Blanche Mulcahy. She died at Mangrove Mountain in 1915.

Prior to 1900 the family name was Gray, not Le Gray. This can only reliably be dated to a time coinciding



with the discharge of four of the Gray children who were, due to neglect, made State Wards (Vic.) in 1888. "Our" Richard Le Gray was born after 1888 when they were registered as state wards, so he was taken care of by his mother Mrs. Bissaker in Cootamundra.

Perhaps changing the family name was a way for them all to start new lives. One of the children changed from George Walter Gray to Walter Arthur Bray. There are many colourful twists in the Gray tale. What was happening in 1898 when Blanche Edith Bissaker, Steam Dye Works Cootamundra, advertised a £10 reward for evidence that would lead to criminal proceedings against people "falsely and maliciously slandering her character"? Or when in 1888 George Charles Gray turned himself in to the police after taking an overdose of Chlorodyne (note said his wife was not to blame)? - He recovered.

Walter Bray enlisted in 1916, another brother Louis Bertram Le Gray in 1915 and Richard Le Gray in October 1916, the same year his father died.

After being presented with a radium dial wrist watch and soldiers' kit at the Somersby School of Arts in November 1916, Richard boarded the S S Suevic en route for the war. Sadly, on the 16th of December 1916, after two to three week's illness, he was transferred to the Alexandra Hospital in Cape Town where he died of measles and pneumonia aged 21. He is buried in the Maitland Cemetery Cape Town.

Although we know the end of Richard's story, there are still many mysteries remaining about

short and troubled life. When his property was advertised for auction in 1918, "a conditional purchase, improvements included a small dwelling house, fencing, 6 acres of orchard and citrus trees just coming

MARKET IN REVIEW

What's happening to the real estate market in the midst of lockdown, Aiden Devine @ realestate.com.au has just published this article.

Extended lockdown has put Sydney's booming housing market on ice as sellers pull the plug on auctions and delay listing new properties.

There were originally going to be just under 800 city auctions this week - a drop from the over 1000 in the week preceding lockdown - but early indicators were many would not go ahead. Close to 60 per cent of the homes that would have gone under the hammer last week sold prior to their auction, while 23 per cent were withdrawn or postponed, CoreLogic figures showed. Under current restrictions, home seekers are permitted to view listed properties only by private inspection. Open homes and public auctions on site are not allowed.

Realestate.com.au head of economic research Cameron Kusher said the restrictions were putting the brakes on new listings but would do little to derail buyer confidence. "There is enough momentum in the market for there to be a very quick bounce back when lockdown ends," Mr Kusher said.

The lesson from Melbourne's four month lockdown last year was that restrictions discouraged sellers more than buyers, he added. "The Melbourne lockdown didn't impact as much you'd think," Mr Kusher said.

"There was a drop in sales activity but there were still committed buyers. Lockdown is not as strict and that will make a difference. There are also tools that make it a lot easier to view (homes) without stepping foot on the property". Mr Kusher said home seekers who thought it would be a good time to swoop in on a potential bargain would probably be disappointed.

Ray White chief economist Nerida Conisbee said the lockdown would have a stronger influence on what home seekers purchased, rather than whether they purchased at all. The experience of previous lockdowns was that increased time at home often encouraged families to seek out bigger properties in lower density areas, she said. "Lockdowns last year encouraged more people to look outside of capital cities to regional areas where they could get bigger houses". Ms Conisbee said.



There appear to be misconceptions; At the meeting at Mangrove hall it was indicated that Roman Catholics were unwelcome, that was new to me, frankly I was shocked, then I remembered a time in the 60's, when I was employed as a governess. It was required as part of my employment that I attend the Catholic services with the children, I learned that good Catholics were forbidden to attend the worship places of any other denomination, some priests would not even sanction the attendance at weddings and funerals. I do not think it was the union church that made such a ruling but they could have acknowledged a decision that was already in place, that makes more sense

With regard to coming late to the service, I found it difficult to find when or at what time. My first attempt was on the wrong day, the second I had been told 9.30 arrived at what would have been a bit early but was late. My

3rd attempt I got it right but found the service had been cancelled "without notice" as dis others. Am told it was put on the internet, that would be fine however some of us can't get the wretched net.

With regard to morning tea on the one occasion I did make it (Mother's Day) although I was expected elsewhere. I felt it would be downright rude not to accept the invitation. I was mystified with the change of routine, on other past occasions when I attended everything was put out and everyone helped themselves then mingled with the others. On this occasion we were obviously expected to sit at the tables, possibly because of COVID. I had barely a nodding acquaintance with a couple of people but was seated next to a total stranger. Some people remained standing near the goodies others appeared to prefer the kitchen, I would have welcomed the opportunity of getting to know others!

It would appear that people who would normally never darken the door of a church, when the going gets really rough find solace in spending time "meditating" in the foyer of the church. Until this Sunday I thought the gates were locked as a sign "outsiders were unwelcome" to use the premises.

It appears that the Committee felt unable to share their difficulties with the community, I fin that extremely sad. If there was a problem finding a preacher I am sure had we been

I do not feel that the Church should be sold or that if it is the proceeds should go outside the community. I know there are alternative solutions. I cannot grasp why the decision to sell it was dumped on us without any forewarning!

Country roads and fatigue a lethal combination

Andrew's rescue story is testimony to one of the most dangerous factors when it comes to road travel that many drivers take on without realising the possible outcomes of those decisions: fatigue.

On 1 August 2014 on his way to Newcastle through Bundarra, Andrew Bailey was airlifted by the Westpac Rescue Helicopter Service after a head on motor vehicle accident near Yarrowyk, 40km from Armidale.

The only memory that Andrew has of this day is getting in the car, driving out of town and then waking up four days later at Tamworth Base Hospital.

Both ankles broken, shattered femur, lacerations all over his body and a nasty concussion.

Looking at photos of the car wreckage and the severe injuries this caused, Andrew is very lucky to be alive.

Andrew's recovery was long, spending four weeks in Tamworth Base Hospital and then another 14 weeks at Inverell Hospital.

"My recovery included learning to walk again, lots of physio and many psychologist appointments. I still have trouble today with my ankles and right leg," Andrew said describing his recovery.

Now six years after the accident Andrew, his wife Monica and their four children, John (13yrs), Connor (12yrs), Miah (9yrs) and David (7yrs) are doing well with Andrew stepping into a new role as a full time car detailer.

The Bailey family would have been in very different circumstances today if the Critical Care Medical Team from the Rescue Helicopter were not



available in these regional areas.

One Driver Fined Every 38 Seconds In NSW

NSW Labor has found one driver is expected to be fined every 38 seconds for low level speeding as a consequence of the new scheme to implement mobile speed cameras without signage, which the NSW Government plans to triple.

Since the implementation of the new mobile speed camera method fine revenue has risen by an astonishing 1700 per cent, with the number of fines also rising by over 1500 per cent.

With the success of the method the NSW Government is pledging to triple the amount of the disguised mobile speed cameras on NSW roads, which would consequently mean fines could increase for low-level speeding by over 65,000 per month.

Liesl Tesch MP, Member for Gosford has criticised the cash-grab move.

"The only "success" of this program has been some extra dollars from a revenue raising stunt instead of actually minimising speeding by getting people to slow down."

"It is a cheap and irresponsible grab at NSW pockets, targeting low-level speeding which is often committed by hard working families who are trying their very best to stay afloat during this already difficult economic period."

NSW Labor is opposed to the scheme instead calling for the warning signs to be reinstated and for a boost of police visibility on roads.

This call comes after more revelations of just \$27.1 million of the Community Road Safety Fund allocated to policing over the last year while \$40.6 million was spent on implementing more speed cameras.

Ms Tesch says the scheme is clearly only a means to raise revenue, not to initiate safety.

"The revenue from fines of less than 10km above the speed limit has risen by over \$15 million since 2020 and if the Berejiklian Government intends to cover that up by saying less cars were on the road in 2020, then the difference between 2019 is just under \$15 million which is still a huge increase."

"If the scheme really was targeting safety, then I'd like to see the same skyrocketing decrease in accidents and fatalities on our roads, which we are unfortunately yet to see."

"I alongside NSW Labor will continue to push the Berejiklian Government to put in sensible and safety inducing measures to ensure NSW is protected from life threatening incidents - that includes more police visibility, not limiting speed camera visibility."

The Importance of Exercise

If people could put anything they wished for into a magic pill, I'm sure most would choose the benefits that come from exercise. Exercise has many benefits, and because there is no such 'magic pill', it's important we fit exercise into our daily routine. However, which form of exercise is the best, and how much exercise should we be aiming for?

The 4 main forms of exercise are:

- 1. Aerobic using your large muscles to promote the circulation of oxygen through your blood. It is associated with an increased rate of breathing.
- 2. Strength also called resistance exercise, it is anything that causes your muscles to contract against an external resistance
- 3. Flexibility the range of motion that is possible at a joint
- 4. Balance your ability to withstand de-stabilising forces

Most health benefits can be achieved with 150 minutes of exercise each week of a moderate intensity (30min 5 times a week). Adults should include in this: 2-3 sessions of strength exercises, 2-3 sessions of stretching for about 10 minutes, and incorporate balance exercises (such as tai chi, yoga, or coordination activities) into their daily routine. Children from ages 6-17 should aim for 60 minutes per day.

It sounds like a lot, but it's really not, and when you consider it's benefits,

it's going to save you in the long run. With physical inactivity being the 4th leading risk factor in global mortality, we can't afford to not exercise.

Physical activity improves sleep onset, duration, and quality. Exercising improves your brain function and reduces both depressive and anxietyrelated symptoms, along with also decreasing your risk of some cancers, including cancer of the breast, colon, and lung.

The great thing about exercise is that you get the effects immediately. After a single episode of activity your blood pressure lowers, and your insulin sensitivity improves, along with your mental function. Within days to weeks your risk of disease starts decreasing.

For those over 65 years, the above guidelines still stand (as much as is possible for each individual), however, the benefits of resistance exercise in older people may be greater, and balance exercises become more important to help prevent injuries from falls.

Losing weight by focusing on exercise alone has been proven to be ineffective. Whilst it improves your blood pressure, insulin sensitivity, and blood fats, it has little effect on weight. Your diet is the most effective strategy to lose weight, however, exercise is needed to maintain weight loss in most cases.

So, set a goal, monitor your progress, create reminders throughout your day, and most importantly, find the type of exercise you enjoy. Talk to your doctor or health care professional about what they would recommend for you in terms of an exercise prescription. All those benefits are not going to fit into a pill - so you need to get out there and just do it.


