## HAPPY NEW YEAR **TO YOU ALL !**

Some of us are starting the year with a better internet option at least, but there are some things you need to know.

DOWNLOAD THE STARLINK APP !

1. Use the "Visibility" tool on the app before you order the kit. It should have no red.

2. If you live on the south side of the valley or have obstructions like tall trees to the south, you will have dropouts or worse still no signal. Starlink might not be for you !

Check With The Visibility Tool.

3. The dish currently points south at about 45 degrees with an active angle of 100 degrees, so just look south at 45 degrees (half way between vertical and horizontal) and check for obstructions, then check with the visibility tool.

4. The Starlink network is under continuing development, so there are occasional dropouts. This is unlikely to affect anything other than "LIVE" interaction like video calls, gaming, etc.

Emails, web surfing and movies won't be affected as much.

PLEASE READ THE WEBSITE INFO and THE SUPPORT SECTION IN THE APP.

This system is so simple to use if you read the questions and comment section in the app.

## PEATS RIDGE CWA

On behalf of our members I would like to wish you all a Healthy Happy New Year.

This year 2022 is a special year for our organisation the Country Womens Association of NSW as it turns 100 years.

It all started at Crookwell, NSW.

The following information I will be quoting from a book called Serving The Country.

The Bushwomen's Conference which was held in April 1922. An idea from Dr.Richard Arthur, the member of Parliament for North Sydney, was a great believer in voluntary organisations and what they could achieve. Dr Arthur was aware of the plight of rural women especially in regard to health matters and advocated the holding of a bush conference.

Several months earlier Miss Florence Gordon had a plan for "Country Womens Union of Help" and twenty five women joined up, but once Dr Arthur presented his views it was obvious that the first step towards an effective organisation would be to hold a conference and therefore the first Bushwomens Conference was the birth of the Country Womens Association.

The most important woman was Mrs

Hugh (Grace) Munro wife of a wealthy landowner who with her friend Mrs H.C.McIntyre "saw in a flash" that it was a job only country women could do for themselves and for each other. With the light of a candle Mrs Munro jotted down ideas that later formed the basis of the Constitution of the CWA. Mrs Munro caught the train to the city from her home in Bingara and with Mrs McIntyre organised the Conference. Branches were then formed of this non-political organisation. The CWA was formed out of desperate need. Country women were fighting isolation, an appalling lack of health facilities and the constraints of a male dominated society. The Association was built by women who had to watch helplessly as their children died from minor illnesses. These women realised they had nowhere to turn but themselves - and the result was staggering. Within a year the Association was a unified, resourceful group that was going from strength to strength. The members

worked tirelessly to set up baby health centres, fund bush nurses, build and staff maternity wards, hospitals, schools, rest homes, seaside and mountain holiday cottages and much more. At the same time they continued to run their homes in which they were often mother, nurse, teacher and general hand.

Still quoting from book SERVING THE COUNTRY.

The First Bushwomens Conference. On the first day of the Conference, the organisers had a bad case of nerves. They had invited Dame Margaret Davidson, wife of the Governor of New South Wales to open the Conference. The doors were opened to the public and soon the organisers realised they had no need for concern. The hall was soon filled to overflowing. Mrs Grace Munro acted as Chairman. Miss Williams, the nurse in charge of baby health centres, gave a talk on the care of babies and many women who were mothers learned practical techniques of mothering and perhaps jealous of city women who had access to Tresilian nurses where trained nurses would tell them if they were doing the right thing for their infants. In an era when babies died from such simple complaints as respiratory infections, diarrhoea or complications of diseases such as measles, this knowledge was vital to women without access to medical facilities. Professor Lancelot Harrison gave a talk on the "Insect Menace to Rural Life"-flies, women struggling to cope with unsanitary toilet facilities and primitive kitchens. Sydney's only woman architect Florence Taylor talked about how to make homelife more comfortable such as shutters and insecg protected sleepouts. The women in the hall felt that their problems were being understood and appreciated. An energetic woman Mrs Stelhen Laver of Crookwell was the first President of the Womens section of the Victorian Farmers Union organised a rest room where mothers could take toddlers and babies when tney came to town in town of Loch in the South Gippsland.


The Conference opened up for women to speak on their concerns about lack of schools, the doctors who wouldn't come in little country towns, the bad impassable roads to the nearest hospital and much more. Some women spoke of the strength and endurance they needed to carry on with their daily tasks such as killing the meat, tend to vegetable gardens, milk the cow and make butter and cheese. They also had to cook enormous meals for families and the station hands, cooking in camp ovens and fuel stoves. They simply wanted balance-a richer community life, a few books or magazines which were discarded by the thousand in the city and they needed a break. The womens objectives were to secure reduced train fares from the inland to the coast

in summer to get support for a seaside home and have maternity wards in country hospitals. It was proposed that the organisation be called "Womens Institute " but Mrs Munro protested this is a country womens association and that is what we want to call it. The brief of the new Country Womens Association was straightforward - to improve conditions for women on the land.

# IDPD: Less Talk, More Action On Disability Employment

Happy International Day of Persons with Disabilities (IDPD). This year's theme is "Leadership and participation of persons with disabilities towards an inclusive, accessible and sustained post-Covid-19 world".

The dire need for inclusion for people with disabilities has been in the headlines for years with media stories of discrimination and bullying peppering our newspapers and social feeds.

As a person with a disability, exclusion for us is still very common place, especially in the workplace.

The barriers, both physically and socially, placed in front of people with disabilities are in reality a barrier to Australia's potential. It's time Australia had an examination of our relationship with people with disabilities.

The Royal Commission into Violence, Abuse, Neglect and Exploitation of People with Disability has been running since 2019 and has offered people with disability a real moment to express the sheer extent of discrimination we encounter every day.

Recently the Commission heard about the barriers faced by people with disabilities when they seek the right to work.

As a Labor Member, I believe work is so important to our identity. Being employed not only says to someone that their time is worth something – it says their contributions are valued by society.

As a person with a disability work provides a symbol of inclusion in a world determined to sideline you.

Recently, Olivia Sidhu a 22-year-old Sydney woman with Down Syndrome shared her story about getting a job. She describes receiving a proper wage is her "greatest achievement".

This is the power of employment for people with disabilities.

Disappointingly, Government's across Australia fail to recognise and address disability employment gaps, with their own ambitious targets announced with fanfare often falling down the priority list.

For example, prior to the 2019 NSW election, then-Premier Gladys Berejiklian outlined a number of Premier's Priorities which included the target of 5.6% of people to be employed by the NSW Public Service by 2025.

One year later, the State of the Public Sector 2020 report recorded a decrease in the percentage of people with disabilities and admitted they were likely to fall short of their goal. It is blatantly obvious one year on the "Premier's Priority" has been abandoned.

The report instead pointed to their employees as the real source of the decrease, claiming that when people were given the opportunity to state their disability status anonymously the sector showed a higher rate of disability employment.

This is plainly a cop out.

The former Disability Discrimination Commissioner, Dr Graeme Innes argued powerfully to the Disabilities Royal Commission that the onus isn't on people with disabilities to identify themselves to their employers; the onus should be on employers to create an inclusive environment which encourages people who have a disability to identify without fear or bullying from their workplace.

Because as Dr Innes pointed out "... employers need to show us that that situation is changing, and that we will be welcomed in the workplace, not discriminated against."

The same NSW Public Sector report also found that those who do work for the NSW Public Service have reported high levels of bullying, with 24.2% of people living with a disability reporting they had been bullied at work within the 12 month period. That's almost double the rate of the bullying that was experienced by public sector employees overall in NSW.



One priority the Government could not deny was the Australian Paralympian athletes success at the Tokyo 2020 Paralympics held this year, where they brought home a total of 80 medals, with 21 gold, 29 silver and 30 bronze.

In 2021 this incredible result and media outcry led to the recognition and equal pay for Olympains and Paralympians alike.

As a former Paralympian, I know the powerful message this sends to those who have competed past, present and into the future. We are valued as highly as our Olympian brothers and sisters.

Discrimination in our workplaces is still a constant. Even as a Parliamentarian the barriers remain.

In 2017 I was elected as the Member for Gosford. As I was forced to take the back entrance on my first day of work the silent discrimination was louder than ever before.

When I first arrived I was reminded regularly that "this is the oldest Parliament in Australia" as though this is a license to discriminate against people with disabilities. The inaccessibility of Parliament was obvious and there were parts of my workplace I couldn't dream of getting to.

After four years of meetings and letter-writing, this year ramps were finally built in the Speaker's Garden and the north side of the building.

I was wheeled out for the opening of

one of these ramps but the emotions I felt were very mixed; on the one hand I was very happy that people with various physical disabilities can now access that beautiful garden and one side of the building - but I was bitterly disappointed, and I still am, that this kind of infrastructure has taken four vears to install and there are still many areas within the building which are still so hard for people like me to reach.

Since I arrived in Macquarie Street, the ongoing conversations with both the Parliament and the Government about the accessibility to our workplace have been tiresome.

January is a great month to take some time to think about what you'd like to create in your garden for the year. Having a vision for your garden gives you motivation when you are wondering what to do next, and helps you plan and focus your efforts. It's also a great opportunity to sit with a cool drink in the air-conditioning and seek inspiration from those beautiful gardening books you received for Christmas. Is there a part of your garden you've been meaning to change? Do you have enough of your favourite flowers or trees in your garden or is it time to add more? What is the one thing that, if you began this month, would make a significant difference in your garden this year?

If you need reminding, January is also the month to:

- · dead-head your flowers
- check for the pests that thrive in these wet and humid conditions

- check roses for aphids and fungal diseases
- give your lawn a slow-release fertiliser
- sow flowers ageratum, alyssum, calendula, echinacea, forget-menot, linaria, nasturtium, pansies, Iceland poppies, stocks, verbena, viola,
- sow veggies such as chillies, climbing and dwarf beans, beetroot, broccoli, cabbages, carrots, cucumbers, endive, leeks, lettuce, parsnips, potatoes, radishes, rhubarb crowns, silverbeet, sweet corn, zucchini

Flower of the month: Dahlia – these are flowering gloriously in January and here are some photos from our members.

Vegetable of the month: Cucumber – we have been over-run by cucumbers in our garden, the crunchy, crisp taste of summer. The heirloom crystal apple cucumbers have been delicious, and the Lebanese variety also a favourite. 
