Pop-up Recovery Hubs

Two Pop-up Recovery Hubs will open at Spencer and The Entrance from Monday 14 March to support affected communities. Council is working with Resilience NSW to ensure residents have access to information and support services to aid recovery following the recent severe weather event.

Extracts from a Submission by Kevin Brooks to IPART

In May 2021, IPART largely rejected CCC's application for a permanent 15% Special Variation (SV). IPART restricted the SV to three years. IPART explained the main reason for its decision was the SV would raise far more money than was needed for its stated purposes, mainly paying off emergency loans from the financial crisis. IPART also suggested that CCC should use the breathing space to improve productivity and liberate efficiencies from the merger.

This SV application raises about \$26M per year. If Council only needs \$11M per year to pay off the loans from the financial crisis, what is the other \$15M a year for?

It seems, CCC has a recurring structural deficit that has still not been brought under control. What has caused this recurring structural deficit? General rates have gone up well in excess of inflation over the past decade. Before the merger, IPART granted Wyong Council a 31% increase over four years in 2013/14, and this was passed on to Gosford last year as part of rates harmonization leading to a 42% average increase in Gosford rates when added to the SV.

At the same time, services have been significantly cut. So, if rates have risen well above inflation, and services have been cut, why does CCC still have a recurring structural deficit even after paying off it loans?

Mr Brooks also pointed out in a separate submission on water charges "Central Coast Council's proposal for a 34% water rate hike, coming on top of a 42% increase in general rates in Gosford this year, represents an extraction of economic rent by a monopoly service provider on a grotesque scale. IPART exists to protect customers from monopoly pricing.

Mr Brooks writes "If IPART allows any part of this appeal, it will need to explain why it is doing so after rejecting it last year despite the reasons for rejection equally applying this year.

IPART will also need to explain how it ever expects CCC to reform itself and its culture, improve performance, productivity, and efficiency, if it keeps getting bailed out by ratepayers.

CEN believes in Ecological Sustainable Development (ESD) and opposed all threats to it.

That is why we have responded to the NSW Government's 'new approach to rezoning' with caution.

Our submission in response to the Department of Planning's discussion paper said we opposed the idea of giving greater control of some aspects of land rezoning to landowners and property developers.

The EP&A Act already includes provisions and loopholes which can be used to expedite rezonings—sometimes at the expense of ESD!

We don't believe there is any need for the proponent in a rezoning to meet with the rezoning authority to discuss a potential rezoning application, for example.

We believe removing oversight mechanisms and providing merits appeal rights to developers would jeopardise ecologically sustainable decision making about how land should be zoned.

We oppose the removal of the gateway determination process – ICAC's March 2021 Report on the Investigation into the conduct of councillors of the former Canterbury City Council and others (p194-195) made the importance of Gateway clear.

In fact, we think objectors, usually concerned community members, should be afforded merits review rights on rezonings.

According to the ICAC, third party merits appeal rights improve decision making and safeguard against biased or corrupt decision-making.

Submission writing is only one of the many things we do at CEN on a daily basis to protect ESD and oppose threats to it.

Moving towards storm and flood recovery

The Central Coast is starting to recover from the impacts of the recent severe weather event which saw substantial rainfall and localised flash flooding, however parts of our region are still impacted.

Safety and supporting the affected community continues to remain a priority for Council.

A Recovery Committee has been established and Council is working with Resilience NSW as we move forward.

While water is receding there is still major flooding continuing throughout the Hawkesbury area. Power remains out in the area however Ausgrid continue to address power outages where accessible to do so. The Rural Fire Service (RFS) are making arrangements to deliver fuel for generators which has been donated by a volunteer. The SES and RFS are continuing to contact residents where possible and monitor flood levels and deliver food hampers and fuel. WelFAC have provided hampers and water with continued supply available where required. The Ambulance Service, RFS and NSW Health are continuing to assist with welfare checks and provision of support.

The Evacuation Centre at The Diggers at The Entrance remains open and continues to operate 9am to 6pm as needed. Residents in temporary accommodation will start to return home if possible.

For emergency help, call NSW SES on 132 500, or in a life-threatening emergency, call Triple Zero (000).

All 15 patrolled Central Coast beaches remain closed. The Grant McBride baths and the ferry at Wisemans Ferry also remain closed. With current large dangerous sea conditions and large tidal variations do not attempt to access rock platforms to observe sea conditions.

Alert for falling trees & powerlines

Following a period of heavy rain, a tree's root system can be compromised as the soil becomes saturated. Please be on alert for high wind predictions and subsequent tree falls.

For emergency help regarding trees down on private property call the NSW SES on 132 500 or visit their website www.ses.nsw.gov.au for information on how to plan and prepare for storm or flooding emergencies.

For fallen powerlines or trees on powerlines please call AUSGRID on 13 13 88. Please do not go anywhere near fallen trees as they are often tangled with powerlines and can be extremely dangerous.

Fallen trees over roads can be reported to Council.

Roads

Throughout this severe weather event, Council's road crews have attended over 120 after-hour callouts. and closed more than 80 roads across the Coast, with a number of road closures still in place due to flooding. Council crews are on the ground and reopening roads where water has receded, our foreshores may still be inundated and unsuitable for use at this point.

Council road crews continue to respond to fallen trees over roads, landslips, fix potholes, and repair other damage to our road network. Council's Emergency Incident Committee is continuing to liaise with Transport NSW to collectively address impacts on roads. We ask for the community's continued patience as we prioritise responses.

Ferry Road closed due to landslips and fallen trees. Council is working with the NSW SES, Ambulance Services and other relevant services to provide supplies and assistance during this time. Once river levels further recede, Council crews can commence clean-up works and have the road fully opened. A Local Recovery Committee has also been established to help support affected residents and areas.

Waste services and clean up

As the water recedes and we begin the clean-up, we ask for the community's patience as we attend to the most urgent calls first until we reach all affected areas. Some areas may need additional time to dry or be repaired before we can access for clean ups.

Weekly kerbside bin collections are continuing as normal, however some minor delays may be experienced due to high demands.

Larger volumes of bulky household waste or vegetation can be booked as a bulk kerbside collection through 1Coast (as part of your annual bulk kerbside collection services).

Please note Council is prioritising bulk kerbside collections for flood affected regions.

Spencer and Gunderman

It is anticipated that road opening will occur in this area as waters recede. Council will conduct a sweep of waste collections in this region next week (access permitting), conducting regular kerbside bin collections on Monday 14 March and Thursday 17 March. Also on Thursday 17 March, Council will collect bulky waste presented outside residential properties – these collections do not need to be booked and will not impact any standard bulk waste entitlements.

Disaster Relief Grant

The NSW Government announced 7 March 2022 that the Central Coast has been included in the Natural Disaster Declaration which will allow those affected in our community to be eligible for flood assistance. The Disaster Relief Grant is administered

by Resilience NSW. For more information, go to nsw.gov.au and search 'disaster recovery' or call 1800 018 444.

Disaster affected people can be granted immediate assistance if they do not have the financial resources to meet their immediate needs. Financial assistance can be sourced from the Evacuation Centre who will assess and also refer to appropriate agencies such as Samaritans for support and material aid and Chaplaincy services.

Flood Disaster Recovery Small Business Grants

NSW small businesses and not-forprofits (NFP) affected by the severe weather and floods in February and March 2022 can now apply for up to \$50,000 in NSW Government support. Payments can go towards the cost of safety inspections, building repairs, cleaning equipment, materials needed to resume trade, disposing of debris and spoiled stock, or leasing temporary space. Businesses can apply via the Service NSW website or by calling a Service NSW Business Concierge on 13 77 88.

Your mental health matters

Health & safety during clean-up

Avoid unnecessary risks during clean up:

- Do not enter a damaged building or structure, unless deemed safe to do so by authorities.
- Take great care around electricity

 follow the SES Electricity Safety
 Tips.
- Be alert to snakes, spiders, rats and other wildlife that may have taken

- refuge in the building, structure or furniture.
- If removing or moving waste, remember to practise basic hygiene. Use appropriate personal protective equipment, including dust mask, gloves, covered shoes or boots and full-length clothing to cover your arms and legs.
- All cuts and abrasions should be cleaned, treated with antiseptic and covered immediately. If you have a deep cut or wound, if a wound has had contact with floodwaters or if a wound develops redness, swelling or discharge, seek immediate medical attention.
- Avoid being bitten by mosquitoes. Use an insect repellent on exposed skin areas and reapply every couple of hours. Cover up as much as possible with loose-fitting and light-coloured clothing. Should you or any of your family have severe diarrhoea or vomiting, please seek immediate medical assistance. If you have these symptoms, you'll need extra fluids to replace what you lose. The best fluids to take are those that contain a mixture of special salts (electrolytes) and sugars, (e.g. Gastrolyte) which can be purchased from local pharmacies.

Blooms of Rare Beauty HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY MEETS.

Wonderful bowls of beautiful blooms graced the long tables at the Masonic Hall on Monday night when the Gosford Horticultural Society held its monthly meeting and exhibition. 'If only we had a water supply,' said the President, Mr. C. E. Chapman, wistfully, what a wonderful show we could make.' and then it came on to rain

Mr. D. A. Prentice was busy in the body of the hall with an outsize in pencils, and a serious countenance. No, there were no prizes, but awards - yes, and as in ancient Greece, when the hero's award was a mere laurel wreath, the award was perhaps as highly prized by its recipient as the championship belt would have been by Fitzsimmons or Griffo in the brave days of old.

The show, so worthy, so unpretentious, was only another example of the unacclaimed resources of little

Gosford town - of the grand results that are arrived at week by week here by earnest unselfish little bands of workers, whose driving motive always is the prestige of their district. It seemed a shame that the exhibitors had not the applause of appreciative multitudes to command. They deserved applause - by the bucket-full, but there was little of a gathering, and that all confined to the platform, when Mr. C. E. Chapman (President) opened up. "Our good friend, Mr. Harris, he said, 'has got a nomination for Secretary, who not only is not averse to the job, but who will positively revel in it.' "So we will appoint the Secretary and then we can call a meeting early. This meeting is more or less informal.' Miss Ruth Renwick then was appointed Secretary on the motion of Mr Harris and Mrs R. R. Mortimer. Miss Barbara Ironmonger has intimated that she will not be available for the committee. 'The whole upkeep of the Society is the members' fees," the President reminded them. "In July they all are due again. That will not be long now." Officers present were Messrs Chas. Parry (Treasurer), D. A. Prentice (Secretary), who was busy setting out the tables, and Mr. Chapman (President) who did the judging. Others present included Messrs R. C. King Kemp, H. Parry, Davidson, Harris, D. Starkey. G. Linton, A. E. Debenham, Gavin, and D. A. Prentice, and Mesdames Linton, Mortimer, Gavin, G. Margin, G. M.

Wheeler, E. White, and Miss Ruth Kemp.

Some background regarding "Second Prize Cut Flowers, floating. Miss Ruth Kemp" aged 19 at the time.

When Alexander Hunter in 1880 built a home [which he called Hunclydesterdale, according to the Australian Town and Country Journal in 1893] on what was then called The Penang, now Somersby, he heeled in some camellia seedlings which he had brought with him when he left his nursery in Ashfield in 1884, with the intention of later planting them out. They never got planted out.

In 1929 Mr. George. C. Linton bought the property, named it Kewita, and named the four seedlings Alexander Hunter, Jean Lyne, Constance and Ruth Kemp. In 1981 they were 7 metres high and 9 metres wide. [Jean Lyne, Alexander Hunter and Constance are still extant as camellia cultivars, but I have yet to track down Ruth Kemp, perhaps one of your readers knows of it.]

At the wedding, as described in the Leader, Orange 1942, of Miss Pat Hansen, from Orange, who was married to Richard King Kemp, of Gosford, second son of R. C. King Kemp; "The lovely flowers she carried were given by Mr. Linton, of Gosford, and were fashioned into a bouquet by Miss Ruth King Kemp (the bridegroom's sister)."

"The beautiful camellias used in the bouquets were a special blend of Mr. Linton's own. They were large, in a shade of pink, and he has called them the Ruth Kemp camellias after the bride-groom's sister." ["Ruth Kemp" is described as a semi-double light rose camellia]

The above account of the Horticultural Society meeting, contains some other names familiar to many long-term Mountain residents.

D. A. Prentis was of course the first Headmaster of Somersby Public School, Richard King Kemp was a Gosford solicitor who represented a number of local residents.

e.g.
"Walter Cowlishawv. Edward England, charge of picking wild flowers on private land without consent of owner. Mr. R. C. King Kemp for complainant, Mr. A. D. Hickey for defendant. Walter Cowlishaw, orchardist,

Mangrove Mountain, said he was a brother of Harold Cowlishaw, owner of a property at Mangrove Mountain, which witness managed, and had an interest in. On September 15th, on the Gosford to Bloodtree Road, he saw a car standing"......etc.

[Gosford Times 14 Oct 1926]

In a dispute over burning off: "Somersby Growers In Court

Case of Farmer versus Orchardist Scene: Gosford Police Court. In one corner, George James Turner, Somersby, orchardist, 59 years, of age, and weighing 14 stone. In the opposite corner, Herbert Ainsley Clyde Marshall, farmer, Somersby, 44 years of age, weight, 9 stone 4 lbs. Referee, Mr. A. G. Hardwick, P.M. In Turner's corner was Mr. R. C. King Kemp, while Mr. A.D. Hickey swung the towel for Marshall".

[Gosford Times Thursday 29 October 1936]

Many local growers will have had their labels printed by Ironmongers, Margins soft drinks were popular, and perhaps, like me, you, can remember buying clothes from Mortimers, or getting your shoes from Noel Harris, the exciting part of which was looking at your feet through the X-ray machine.

"Mr. Harris established an up to date children's department. The business ... takes pride in the fact that it has the only X-ray fittings section between Sydney and Newcastle." [Gosford Times 17 December 1954]

Perhaps we ignored the science in those days too.

Spencer Locals Invoke Emergency Plan while Emergency Services Kick into Action

From the 9/3/22 the Hawkesbury River communities including residents of Spencer, Gunderman and Marlowe began to receive care packages, fuel and evacuation by boat where necessary.

Help was provided by the SES, RFS, ADF even a group of Coogee Lifeguards. Initially crews worked from the water ferrying goods by boat to people cut off from roads and this was followed by crews in RFS and SES vehicles.

Many areas had lost power and phone and providers were working to restore services.

Spencer became a staging area for crews to be briefed before moving on to designated assignments.

Spencer locals activated their Community Emergency Response Plan that had been initiated by the River Cares group.

This assisted in coordinating the initial actions and in contacting people to check on safety and needs. The lack of power and phone services proved a major handicap and landslides combined with flooding resulted in some areas being completely cut off and isolated.

The value of having a community led process to be prepared for disaster events and a plan for post-disaster recovery is being demonstrated by the Spencer community.

In the past there would be some years between disaster events but in the last three years we have had massive bushfires, two major flood events, several storms and COVID. There is an imperative for communities to develop their own emergency plans and to demand, from all level of government, greater attention to at-risk communities and to implement a plan for the ongoing provision of resources to prepare for and better

respond to emergencies.

Sir Peter Cosgrove, former Lieutenant General and Chief of Army and former Governor General has said relying on the ADF in disasters is unviable and the Federal Government should fund a paid, highly trained civilian emergency response force that stays in reserve and can be mobilised when needed.

Residents should follow up with their local community groups to find out what disaster preparation guidelines are available and what emergency response plans are in place. Residents can also get involved in helping to prepare plans and to press governments to provide support and resources on an ongoing basis.

It's Déjà Vu - La Nina Strikes Again

Once again the Lower Hawkesbury River has been subjected to devastating floods. We thought we had seen the worst in March 2021, but Mother Nature had other plans. This year the East Coast Low took out it's fury not once but twice which is unprecedented.

Help came straight away from SES bringing sandbags and lots of boots on the ground, Welfac who co-ordinated with the Salvos bringing a multitude of food hampers, water and other provisions, and Ausgrid bringing over 40 portable generators and fuel.

Morale and resilience was strong in the beginning but going into the second week some of the residents were soon reaching the end of their tether. River Cares was able to implement the Community Led Emergency Response plan by keeping in touch with every hamlet (creek community) continually through out every day for updates, providing weather and tide information, taking requests for supplies and additional fuel, counselling and even trying to locate hay bales for hungry cows! The Communities along the Lower

Hawkesbury River rallied together and helped each other.

The destruction that La Nina 2022 has lashed out on us has been even more devastating than last year. The flood has ruined sheds, machinery, general equipment, damage to jetties, property, roads, embankments, vehicles and the list goes on. Tuesday night 9th March a fleet of 6 RFS trucks came down to give the evacuation orders but only a handful of residents complied. Wednesday the tide was expected to be over a metre in some areas higher than last year. The



caravan park became a lake, Wiseman Ferry Road in sections remained a swimming pool all day, even at the low tide the water level remained high. Cohens Creek was unrecognisable.

During the second week Spencer was inundated with a plethora of help from SES, RFS Strike Team from as far as Charmhaven, Avoca and the Peninsula, NSW Emergency Ambulance Services, Surf Life and Rescue Clubs from Bondi, Nobby's Beach, Redhead and Merewether. From Thursday through to the weekend we had the army and air force arrive, even a taskforce from WA - DFES who coordinated the rapid damage assessment and to gauge what needs to be done for the clean-up process. There were helicopters flying overhead nearly every day while Wisemans Ferry Road rumbled with service vehicles and trucks carrying heavy machinery and bobcats etc. One

army contingent arrived via Mooney Mooney on rubber boats to conduct an assessment along the Hawkesbury and to deliver fuel, food hampers and check on those residents completely cut off. Salvos continued to drop off food hampers and Eastcoast Juices donated a massive crate of water to help out. The Spencer Thai donated over 80 delicious food packs to areas such as Mill Creek, Cohens Creek and other parts of the Hawkesbury who had been hit the hardest.

We are so very proud of Alison Wade our Captain of the Spencer RFS with her invaluable experience she coordinated the Strike Force and worked in conjunction with the SES and all the other services daily. Jane McCallum the secretary/treasurer of River Cares and the manager of the Spencer General Store (the new HQ) and her staff were the linch pin feeding all these services, manning the phones, providing information, distributing food hampers & fuel, giving out counselling all with a smile and a friendly face.

Now it's the clean-up! Again help has come in droves.

The Communities along the Lower Hawkesbury River will be forever grateful.

River Communities Cut Off And Suffering From Poor Communication

The Hawkesbury River communities of Spencer, Wisemans Ferry and Gunderman have been cut-off by flood waters after recent weather events that have seen parts of NSW inundated by torrential rain.

Member for Gosford, Liesl Tesch is calling on the NSW Liberal Government to ensure river communities are not forgotten during this emergency and receive up-to-date information, assistance and resources for the recovery phase.

"This is the second time in the space of less than a year that the Hawkesbury River communities are again faced with floods, loss of livelihoods and property. The NSW Government must do everything in its power to ensure residents can access up-to-date information about where to go to seek refuge, access assistance or supplies" Tesch said.

Many river residents have expressed to Ms Tesch that they are without

electricity and telecommunications.

"I have been contacted by emergency services personnel from the river communities and in one example, because there is no electricity and the front roller door of a local RFS facility is powered by electricity, it cannot be operated. The motor generator takes up to 15 minutes to power the roller door and in an emergency situation every minute is precious. There needs to be a better way" said Ms Tesch.

In another blow to the community a major landslip has occurred north of Wisemans Ferry Rd towards St Albans Road, creating cracks in the road and leaving it hanging precariously over the edge of the cliff.

What makes this even more concerning is that this is a main connecting road for the river communities and has left the community fearing more landslides are still possible.

the River Cares group at Spencer says there is a lot of work to do with communication cut offs, electricity connection and road cut-offs.

"We still have a long way to go regarding communication and power outages. We have very poor and limited communication which makes it very hard to touch base with everyone to make sure they're safe. We couldn't reach residents in Mill Creek because they were cut off which meant the SES had to go out and check on them by boat. Not everyone has Facebook or internet for safety information," said Ms Downham

"River Cares implemented our community-led emergency response plan and people cooperated and are thrilled that we came together like this during this difficult time"

River Cares has made a big impact on the responsiveness of the Spencer community says Ms Tesch.

"The voice of River Cares has definitely improved the outcomes for the Spencer community this time around and I want to commend Robyn and her group for their advocacy during this really difficult time".

Ms Tesch has also thanked local emergency services personnel for all the hard work they have been doing and responding to in fast-moving and dangerous conditions.

"I would like to extend my heartfelt thanks to all our amazing, hardworking and selfless emergency services personnel and volunteers including our SES, RFS, Fire and Rescue, NSW Police and all our community members that have helped out neighbours or friends during this emergency".

"It was also incredible to see the help arriving from far and wide with the Coogee Surf Life Saving Club coming to assist, a testament to the community spirit we have throughout NSW."

Residents who have chosen to stay behind rather than head to an evacuation centre at Ettalong Beach or The Entrance have been supplied with generators if they are likely to experience long delays getting their electricity restored.
