Gosford Waterfront Development

At the Ordinary Council Meeting on 27 September 2022, Council resolved to adopt a preferred concept for revitalisation of the Gosford Waterfront, commence community engagement to inform development of a draft Gosford Waterfront Masterplan and seek NSW Government funding to progress this important renewal project to an investment decision.

CentralCoastCouncilAdministrator, Rik Hart, said the time is right to make Gosford an iconic waterfront city, better connecting Sydney to the Central Coast and enhancing opportunities for people to live and work on the Central Coast.

"Revitalisation of the Gosford Waterfront is the Central Coast's key enabling project. It reimagines the waterfront as not only a major opportunity for the city's renewal, but a chance for Gosford City to join the great waterfronts of the world.

"Council will not be funding or delivering the key elements of the waterfront renewal. Instead, Council seeks support for delivery of the project by a dedicated NSW Government development corporation, as occurred at Honeysuckle in Newcastle and Barangaroo in Sydney.

2021-2022 President's Report – AGM 19th September 2022

I will start by thanking all those who are at our 2022 Annual General Meeting of the Mangrove Mountain Christian Group Incorporated (MMCG Inc) for your presence and support. I would also like to thank all those who take the time to read this report, for your interest in our activities. Our Group was incorporated on 21/07/2021 (Incorporation number INC2100719), so this is our first AGM. I will start with a little background to our MMCG Inc Group by way of an FAQ format.

What is the Mangrove Mountain Christian Group (MMCG)? - The MMCG Inc. is the new name for one of the local Christian Congregations who have worshiped in the Mangrove Mountain Union Church for many years. (formerly it was known as the Mangrove Mountain Uniting Church Congregation).

Who are you? - While our

members are a mix of people who are longstanding, re-joined or recently new to the group, it is essentially a continuation of one of the original Union Church congregations that has been worshiping at the Union Church for over 110 years, just a different name.

Why the new name? - In a letter from The Uniting Church in Australia, Narara Congregation, dated 6/5/2021, it was advised that the Mangrove Mountain Uniting Church Congregation would cease from 30/6/2021. Many members of the former Uniting Church congregation wanted their local congregation to continue and so decided to rename their congregation.

Why are you "Incorporated"? - The group was given legal advice that to best represent its members interests, it should become "incorporated".

What do you do? – Our three aims are:-

- 1) To maintain and grow a Christian presence in the Central Coast Mountain localities,
- 2) To ensure the MM Union Church remains open for use by the Christian congregations and the community of Mangrove Mountain.

3) To be appointed the new Trustee of the Mangrove Mountain Union Church property.

Why does the Mangrove Mountain Union Church property need a new Trustee? – Because the current Trustee of the Mangrove Mountain Union Church, Mr Barry Taylor (a Liquidation Consultant to HLB Mann Judd – Advisory and Accountancy), is obstructing the intention of the trust, by not allowing local Christian and Community groups, ourselves included, to use the property that is held in trust for them.

Why is a "Liquidator" the current Trustee of the MM Union Church Property? - The prior Trustee, the Mangrove Mountain Union Church Association Inc (MMUC Inc) was placed into voluntary liquidation by its committee members back on 2nd June 2021. The MMUC was not insolvent at the time of the voluntary liquidation and had approximately \$12,000 in cash assets. The Committee Members of the prior Trustee neglected their duty under the Trust Deed to appoint replacement trustees to the property, prior to putting the MMUC Association into Voluntary Liquidation.

What is the Liquidator now doing with the MM Union Church property? The Liquidator now accepts that it is his role to appoint replacement trustees. Our group, the Mangrove Mountain Christian Group Incorporated, through its solicitor, is currently negotiating with the Liquidator and his legal advisors about how this is to be done.

Notable occurrences for the MMCG since our Incorporation

- Consistently holding Worship Services on 2nd and 4th Sundays of each month with visiting preachers.
- Bible Study Group held 1st, 3rd and 5th Mondays of each month.
- -UnionChurchgroundsmaintenance and picnic lunch completed on 5th Sunday of each month.
- Supporter base, mostly members, approaching 60 in number local, Central Coast and Sydney people
- Fundraisings and donations of approximately \$55,000
- Paid out Legal fees of approximately \$40,000.
- 3 meetings with the Liquidator, Barry Taylor.
- Engagement of Specialist Trust Solicitor, David Baxter of Pike Verekers Lawyers.
- Engagement of Barrister Mark Southwick.

I give many thanks to the members of our MMCG Committee for their significant contributions of time,

Accidents Ain't Accidents

One of the things that I enjoy doing in my healing practise is helping clients become more aware of how their body is always communicating to them. As I'm interviewing my clients, I usually jot down any major physical complaints or injuries as they tell me the story of their life. I can usually see the patterns between what has been happening in their life and the symptoms of illness/disease that occur, as well as specific 'accidents' they have had, and what they might mean for the client.

The universe will often be quite cryptic and mysterious in the way it brings these messages, but in hindsight it is often easier to see how the pieces fit together. Sometimes, there can be several layers into why a person may have an injury, to serve several purposes at once.

The most common one is simply just to force the person to rest and recover from recent stressors that may have been consuming their thoughts. In other words, it forces them to "go within" and just be with themselves for a period of time without the usual distractions (depending on the circumstances). Believe it or not, there have been cases where a person may say light-heartedly "I need a break", and not realise the power of their words. They literally put it out there that they "need a break" so the universe brings it to them!

Another common one I have noticed is when an injury, especially a major one, occurs which makes the person course-correct their life. For example, they may be preparing for some sort of career in the sporting industry, and have a major accident that completely voids their ability to follow the pursuit they so badly wanted, and in hindsight they later realise that they weren't on

their intended path (in terms of the divine) and realise there were greater plans in place for them that would bring them more fulfillment in the longer term. (In nearly every case, the ego mind wants something that the universe knows is not for their greatest good.)

On other occasions it can be that the person, at the soul level, has contracted to have the experience simply to learn from. (You'd be surprised what things souls contract to experience in this realm simply for the learning that comes with it.) On some occasions it can be to do with karma.

The body part affected will often indicate a deeper meaning behind an injury. For example, the arms are to do with doing and the legs are to do with a person's direction in life, or how they are moving. The back is usually to do with stability and support. The pelvis could be to do with balance. The neck can be to do with flexibility or perspective. Hurting a finger can be to do with the finer details of what one is doing, and the toes can be to do with the finer details of how one is moving through their life. The head or brain can be to do with how one thinks. The eyes will be to do with how they see things. The ears will be with how they receive or hear things. The shoulders and clavicles are to do with the burdens they carry. Any joint injury will usually be to do with flexibility about one's approach to something relating to what the body part represents. The universe speaks quite literally through the body in this way.

The right side of the body represents the physical, material, masculine energy of the person, and the left side represents the spiritual, intuitive, feminine energy of the person, so the side an injury exists on will help to interpret the message behind it.

Accidents will also be presented to us in the environment around us. For example, our cars are actually an extension of our own 'vehicle', so any 'accidents' that happen regarding our

cars are also an avenue the universe uses to get a message across to us. This can also include things that occur in or outside of our household. 



'There must be something we can do!' cried Rebecca.

'I have to get back to the Queen but you can wait here. When there is more news I will come back to you.' Sapphire then stood up, and walked quickly away and to another room. The others remaining made the three children as comfortable as possible, keeping them warm and giving them nourishing food and drink.





Roadside Warning: Bushfires Ahead

To start with the obvious: While it is useful and politically advantageous to send ambulances to the bottom of a cliff rather than, at much less cost, put in safety barriers at the top, there seems little sense of urgency from "the powers that be" to prevent the inevitable catastrophe barrelling down the road towards the edge.

How do we avoid plummeting over the approaching tipping point, and reach our desired destination; a low risk fire environment?

As a farmer in rural Ireland said, when asked for directions, "I wouldn't start from here, if I were you" That joke is over 100 years old. So to answer our question, lets start from over a hundred years ago.

My great grand father came to the Mountain in the 1870s, he along with his later neighbours followed a regime of mosaic burning to reduce the risk of damaging bushfires. It was a continuation of indigenous practices that served the early farmers well. His daughter recalled seeing mobs of aborigines passing through on their way to seasonal gatherings, across land they had managed for thousands of years.

The landscape was open then, with less undergrowth. Between the sparser trees and the low regrowth from earlier "burn offs", there flourished the wild flowers for which the district was famous and which fed the kangaroos, wallabies and emus (which feasted on the abundant Christmas bells) remembered by my grandmother, born in 1893. She is gone and so are the flowers.

But here is a landscape prepared a little earlier.

As the First Fleet sailed north towards Botany Bay, the landscape ashore was observed to be open woodland, with smoke arising from small distant fires. According to Cook, Banks and Solander in 1770,

"the woods are free from under wood of every kind and the trees are at

such a distance from one another that the whole Country or at least great part of it might be cultivated without being oblig'd to cut down a single tree; we found the soil every where except in the Marshes to be a light white sand and produceth a quant[it]y of good grass which grows in little tufts about as big as one can hold in ones hand and pretty close to one another, in this manner the surface of the ground is coated in the woods between the trees..."

What was observed was the result of thousands of years of "Firestick-farming". In 1770 Joseph Banks et al. recorded no indication of recent bushfires.

We can't go back, but it is worth noting that the current legislated regime for frequency-of-burning, is designed to maintain a vegetation profile that did not exist before European arrival.

So lets go forward.

My great grand father died in 1927, but already the overall frequency, extent and intensity of bushfires was increasing. A number of factors were in play effecting how this rise could be graphed; growing population density, rainfall and temperature fluctuations; hunting of wildlife (wallaby hunts and hunting dogs with decreased predation of undergrowth); decrease in selective burning of harvestable flora (Christmas bells, ferns and waratahs); abandonment of indigenous land management.

Protection of property relied on landowners individually "burning off" when opportunity arose, and neighbours combining to fight outbreaks. There were early attempts to formalise and organise defences such as the formation of the Bush Fire Fighting Brigade at Somersby by the Fruitgrowers in 1940.

In some ways it anticipated the role of the present RFS.

From The Gosford Times: "The following officers were elected:

Captain, Mr. A. R. Studds; vice-captains, Mr. A. Grant and Mr. R. Evans; advisory committee (one to each zone), Messrs. A. R. Studds, R. Evans, W. Robinson, W. Smith and A. J. Braham.

The objects of the organisation are to give mutual help to neighbours in the event of bush fires threatening homes, sheds, orchards and improved properties only.

The committee will inspect properties and advise owners of fire dangers at the request of the owners. Recommendations issued by the brigade are: -

- (1) Pumps. Keep all hand and power pumps in good order and with straight nozzels attached.
- (2) Equipment. When called to a fire each member must bring three kerosene tins and all available pumps.
- (3) Precautions. Burn off, clean up and underscrub at the end of winter. No burning off after October 1 and up to March 31.
- (4) Enquiries. The committee is to enquire into and report on any fire and take action. It will interview any settler when it is thought necessary."

Good intentions, but two of the recommendation could be reviewed.

Perhaps three kerosene tins might be insufficient these days, and the focus on "homes, sheds, orchards and improved properties only", while reflective of resource limitations, fails to recognise that a whole of landscape strategy is essential. Protection of individuals' "assets and incomes" is severely compromised if fires are ignited and become uncontrollable in land beyond their control, such as National Parks, Forestry, Crown Lands and Local Council controlled land.

The objective of "mutual help to neighbours" is a key narrative in the history of the Mountain Districts.

Examples of neighbouring farmers engaged together in desperate battles against the flames, and of losses sustained, can be found in numerous local and Sydney newspapers. They are part of the folklore that binds the

For example (from the Labor Daily, Sydney, 1936), "CHOKING with smoke and with their hair and clothing singed by the terrific heat, a small band of orchardists Mangrove Mountain fought unsuccessfully yesterday for eight hours in an effort to check one of the largest bushfires in the history of the district. FLAMES 40ft. high, fanned by a strong westerly wind, swept through the tall timber with the speed of an express train and the fighters had to run for shelter in nearby creeks, which for the main part are nearly dry. Women and children fought side by side with the men, burning fire breaks early in the day when it was seen that the fire was approaching, but their efforts went for nothing.'

This fire severely damaged the property of Arthur Lillicrapp amongst others. Ironically it probably "cooked" the prospects of Percy Fuller, the baker, who moved to Armidale.

In 1951 Ted Lorimer the Headmaster at Somersby School, issued the senior boys with wet bags and tree branches, gave them some quick instructions, and with the bushfire approaching, sent them to save a neighbour's house - which they did.

There seems little doubt that with the passing of pre-European methods of land custodianship, bushfires have become more frequent and intense.

The days when farmers would turn up from miles around with their tractors and spray vats to save a neighbours home, as happened with my uncle next door in the 1960s, is a scene being replaced by the red trucks of the RFS (when not required urgently elsewhere). The RFS with its dedicated volunteers does great work, yet with inevitable bureaucratisation and centralisation following 1979, satellite surveillance and computer facilitated coordination, water bombers, helicopters with incendiary bombs and military back-up etc., our most recent bushfire experience was the most threatening yet recorded and most destructive.

More "ambulances" are being ordered. So is this industrial/military strategy working? Can we win this arms race against nature and global heating?

Well I wouldn't start from here.

Unfortunately we missed the start, were not even on our marks when the warnings were loud and clear and the gun went off. Nothing to worry about, someone will invent some whizz bang running shoe technology, and we will do it in a canter.

The race is on, but is it too late to restart and build a better course for us

horses? If the course of history tells us anything, it is that when we exchange wisdom for expediency, we do so at our peril.

Thousands of years of accumulated wisdom and knowledge would suggest that a big picture strategy is needed giving shared custodianship to all land owners and managers, governed by the principles of pre-European understanding.

A governance structure would need to be devised with indigenous voices preeminent vis-à-vis government instrumentalities.

The inevitable costs of fire trails, water tanks etc to facilitated small area mosaic burning would be partly off-set by savings in disaster relief payments, fire damage and insurance costs, fire fighting, aviation fuel, wildfire carbon emissions, and smoke induced illnesses etc.

A critical detail in the big picture is the "smoke arising from small distant fires" (see First Fleet accounts above).

The people who lit those fires had intimate local knowledge of weather patterns, plant species, seasonal conditions, animal behaviour etc., enabling agility in decision making and rapid action to take advantage of windows of opportunity. They, like our early European style farmers, had autonomy and responsibility for their own patch, and were able to mobilise their immediate community when needed.

It worked.

So what lessons can be learned, and how can they be applied to formulating, and rapidly implementing, better methods to deal with the crisis confronting us.

Firstly the bigger picture:

As referred to above, a governance structure would need to be devised with indigenous voices preeminent visà-vis government instrumentalities.

It would have responsibility for a Whole of Area approach to implementing small-scale mosaic mitigation burning, including building and maintaining the infrastructure necessary. In the hundred plus years since this approach was abandoned, developments in technology, scientific knowledge, mapping, mechanisation and communications etc. make the project achievable.

On our own patch we need greater local autonomy, "enabling agility in decision making and rapid action to take advantage of windows of opportunity" to achieve good "burn offs". As this would require authorities relinquishing some control currently within their remit, it is difficult to see how it could be achieved. A new agency, as recommended to the recent Bushfire Inquiry (by Peter Comensoli, might be an option, or, at the grass roots end of the bureaucratic spectrum, technology to empower knowledgeable and equipped locals to obtain "instant" small scale "burn off" approval.

For now, current practices will not avert a looming catastrophe barrelling down the road.

On a brighter note, the tipping point over which travellers would plummet on the Deviation in the past, was called "Sunny Corner"

(It now has a guardrail).
