

election booth as a member of the Gosford state electorate. The Central Coast Plateau Chamber of Commerce made strong representations to the Australian Electoral Commission in 2019 following an outpouring of anger when a former double booth was relegated to being a single one for Dobell and residents living in the former Gosford City Council LGA were told to vote absentee for the Gosford electorate. Around 350 signatures were forwarded with the request to look more carefully at the natural geographical identity when making electoral boundary decisions. Previously the odd boundary line was easily explained tied to Gosford City or Wyong LGAs. It was simply unnecessary to divide a small rural community at the ballot box on the basis of voter numbers when the number of voters in the previous Wyong LGA did not make a significant impact on why there had to be a split community. The Chamber has begun work on a similar change at the federal level.

Central Coast Council.

Business Chambers meet on a regular basis with the general manager and department heads. These Integrated Business Chamber meetings began in an ad hoc fashion when Ric Hart took over as Administrator and now happen bi monthly when possible. We take every opportunity to raise

the importance of regional roads (including with the Premier at a breakfast meeting) especially the fact that state and federal funds are required to assist local government with the cost of maintenance and especially major repairs as has been experienced from flooding. Following representations made by River Cares (Robyn Downham) and our Chamber, a healthy \$8.5 million (CCC has advised \$10m) will make some inroads into Wiseman's Ferry Road repairs.

Affordable housing, CCC's Pile Burning policy, land use, green corridor (E to C zones are an emerging concern), rural lands and agricultural productivity, noxious weeds have all been discussed with Rik Hart and many others.

We were part of Hawkesbury Harvest's concerted efforts from April, 2022 when a Proposed Standard Instrument (LEPs) Amendment (Agritourism) Order which would have effectively restricted either the open days or customer numbers to an Agritourism element to their farm business to an extremely small operational level. There were numerous Zoom and face to face meetings at all levels to achieve a workable option.

had ignored the tourism value of the Central Coast Plateau and adjoining Valleys. We remain disappointed that the council's main initiative remains the Harvest Festival at a time of low agricultural productivity instead of a year round option which the Harvest Trail incorporates. That will evolve in time – the option is there to join and populate the CC Plateau Harvest Trail on the Hawkesbury Harvest website which has a large exposure to the Sydney consumer base.

A FAREWELL TO SUE ELLISON

23 March 1938 - 15 February 23

Hi everyone,

Thank you so much for coming here today, to celebrate my mum, Sue Ellison's wonderful life.

I look forward to sharing Mum's wonderful life.

Susan Jean Ellison OR Sue as we all knew her. Her nickname whilst at school was 'boggy' as in marsh/ Marshall, mum would end her emails to all of us as:

M.S.G. for Mum Sue Granny Mum was born in Harrogate Yorkshire, her Parents were Harry John and Mary Charlotte Marshall. Mum was the eldest of 3 children. Her twin brothers Chris and Tim came along 18 months later. They have both passed on now. Which Mum would jokingly say – that made me the winner!

Given that she was older, it gave her the upper hand, coercing them into mischief as often as she possibly could. She loved to tell the story of how she talked her brothers into stealing all her mums clothes pegs and then dressing up with all the rags as gypsies and then getting them to come with her down to the street corner to sell the pegs at the traffic lights. Her parents found out and mum blamed the boys saying it was all their idea. They twins both copped it. Mum did this sort of stuff as often as she could and because it was always 2 against one, she loved it when she got them back!

My favourite story of mum being naughty when she was little (I'm only up to about 9 years of age here!!), was when mum actually started chaos at Bettys Tea House – a very famous tea house that founded in 1919 in Harrogate, England that is still thriving. It was a very fancy birthday

party for a little boy turning 10. Mum didn't like little Charlie and thought he was a bit of a pain ... so thought the best option was to let rip and chuck a custard tart across the room at Charlie and see what happened. Well it went off, all hell broke lose and all the kids at the party got into it. All the parents were there having high tea so on this occasion, mum didn't get away with anything and she was never allowed to go back to Bettys. Her parents were mortified.

Mum had a wonderful childhood and grew up through the war years. She went to boarding school when she was 10 and developed many life long friends, who she always kept in contact with. There were 4 of them that were thick as thieves. Hi Suzanne, I know you are watching from Lincolnshire. And hi to all mums family and friends in Leeds.

Over the years, they have got together often and when they all turned 70, off they went to Tuscany for a reunion. They were staying in a beautiful villa having a fabulous time, but had to be told more than once by management that they needed to keep the noise down because they were disturbing all the other guests – and dancing on the table was forbidden!

While at school, mum had many sporting achievements, including Captain of the School Hockey team and playing in the Yorkshire County Rep team, highest batting average in cricket and winning a cricket bat as her trophy. Also, while still at school she enjoyed playing tennis and one year qualified for Junior Wimbledon doubles and made it to the quarter finals of Wimbledon.

Mum always loved to sneak up and have midnight feasts on the rooftop of the boarding house and throw eggs at the older students that she didn't like very much!

When I was in primary school, she would win the mums 100m sprint against the other mums – I was always so proud. And I would always encourage her to join in the three-

legged races as well. I was so lucky to have her help me navigate growing up.

Mum met my father Bob in 1963 and migrated to Australia and married him in December 1964. They were married for 36 years till 2000. I was born in 1966 and have nothing but glorious happy memories of mum. Life was one big adventure and she always made everything fun.

Mum never liked to big note herself – she always just wanted to get on with what needed doing. But today, is my chance to share with you some of these amazing accomplishments because I have always been so proud of my mum.

Mum was always involved with important matters that involved her community. I'm sure all the local politicians on the eastern side of Australia will be pleased they no longer need to deal with 'That Sue Ellison' who was always fiercely determined to get what was needed for the community.

Mum sorted out the land grant for the North Shore Amateurs Bee association, fighting with Ku-ringgai Council until they got part of the golf course. She was instrumental in starting the foundation of this association and was a keen apiarist and more than once, she won the small producers award at The Royal Easter Show

She also helped a lot with education of bees and their environment. Mum often visited schools and also ran workshops, she also taught how to manage hives, how to deal with swarms – and I remember for many years our home phone number was the Bee Swarm hotline and then in spring time, mum would be off chasing the swarms.

She was President of the North Shore Amateurs Bee Association for many years and was in constant contact with Bruce White, the Minister for Agriculture. She attended International Bee Conferences in Tasmania and Queensland and was

the Australian correspondent for the British Bee Keeping Association.

Mum quickly settled into life at Lower Mangrove and was soon involved in local Spencer community Group and was president for a number of years. She received an award from the Spencer Community Progress Group in Appreciation for her services.

She was also strongly involved with the Local Rural Fire Brigade and always loved helping in any way possible to raise much needed funds. Her skills at not only rallying local pollies, but playing them against each other to up what they got was legendary.

Mum received a Certificate of Life Membership from the NSW Rural Fire Service for all she has done.



Member Spotlight – March – Ross Morrison

If you've enjoyed the photos of previous gardens we have visited, then it's highly likely that they were taken by Ross. Ross and Helen joined garden club just a year ago and are both the kind of people who are the first to jump in and help make things happen. I discovered recently just how delicious their home-grown tomatoes and cucumbers are, and I was lucky to get Ross to stay still just long enough to answer our questions for this month's member spotlight.

1. How long have you been a member of KDGC and why did you join?

About a year. Helen and I saw the articles about KDGC in the local newsletter. We thought it would be a good way to meet like-minded people in the local community, and a good place to find inspiration for the gardens we plan to create at our place.

2. Who or what first sparked your love of gardens / gardening?

I have always loved gardening and had a fascination for nature, and growing plants in particular. Some of my earliest and happiest childhood memories are of working in the garden with my father.

3. What do you most like about being part of KDGC?

It's a great opportunity to speak with other gardeners, see the gardens that they have created and swap ideas. Everyone approaches gardening differently and I find that I learn something new every time, and usually come home full of inspiration to create something new in my own

4. What do you enjoy most about gardening / gardens?

There's something fascinating about watching plants grow, especially if you start with a seed or cutting, and a sense of anticipation which becomes a sense of satisfaction when they reach their full potential. It's about being creative, of being deeply involved with nature.

5. Who inspires you?

My father was a very passionate gardener. He started with a new house on a virtually empty block and landscaped it all himself. He created a magnificent vegetable garden that kept us supplied with vegies all year round, and a bush garden with a collection of native plants that he mostly propagated himself.

6. What's a key piece of wisdom

you'd share with a new gardener?

A garden is a dynamic thing, so don't be afraid to change things around and try something new. If a plant is past it's best or just isn't doing what you had in mind, it's okay to pull it out and replace it with something else.

7. What have you learned since joining KDGC?

I have learned many things in the short time I have been a member. Most significantly, I'm now familiar with many plants that I hadn't previously seen, and I've gained a lot of ideas about garden design from visiting gardens and talking with the people who created them.

8. What's your favourite plant / flower / veggie / herb?

I don't have one particular favourite, but I like to grow a lot of the more common vegetables such as tomatoes, cucumbers, lettuce and corn, because they taste so much better straight from the garden. I also like growing flowering annuals such as zinnias, asters and strawflowers, because of the explosion of colour they produce in such a short time.

9. What is one thing that you can do / have done that not many people know about?

A couple of years ago I left my "real" job selling laboratory equipment and started a gardening business. Now I get paid to do something I really enjoy. My son has seen how much fun I'm having, and he has just started his own



Some Horse & Rabbit **Terminology**

Horse is a domesticated large single hoofed mammal (Equus caballus).

- Colt is a male horse under 3 years of age.
- Filly is a female horse under 3 vears of age.
- Foal is a young equine under 1 year of age.
- Gelding is a castrated male horse.
- Mare is a female horse after her 4th birthday.
- Stallion is an intact male horse.

Rabbit is a mammal of the family Leporidae or the domesticated **Old World species Oryctolagus** cuniculus.

- Buck is a male rabbit.
- Doe is a female rabbit.
- Fryer or "young rabbit" is a rabbit that is 2 months old and weighs 1.7kg to 2kg.
- Kit is a baby rabbit.
- Rabbitry is where owners keep their herd of rabbits in separate
- Stewer or "mature rabbit" is a rabbit 3 months of age or older averaging 6 pounds or more.
- Warren is where owners keep their herd of rabbits as a group in a large cage or enclosure.


