## Should **Bucketty** have a pub?

After a nearly 2-year application process, Cessnock Council is due to vote on the proposed pub/restaurant and ancillary brewery located in Bucketty at a council meeting on the 23rd of October.

This is our second attempt at bringing the hospitality of beer making and communal enjoyment that comes with it to Bucketty.

My wife, Alexi, and I originally planned to open the first "Bucketty's" in the actual suburb of its namesake, however we stumbled after receiving poor advice and the original application was rejected in 2019. After licking our wounds, we proudly opened a version of Bucketty's brewery & pub at the beachside suburb of Brookvale in 2021. Bringing the bush to the beach and having a blast while doing it.

Creating a business and becoming part of a community has been incredible. Neither of us had any experience in brewing or hospitality when we started this journey so we've had to learn fast, particularly as we first opened smack-bang in the middle of the pandemic.

While it's been great running Bucketty's in Brookvale, we never gave up on the original dream of creating a brewpub in Bucketty.

So! We're having a crack - but this time around we're a little wiser, understanding the complexities of the application process and community expectations.

Our dream is for Bucketty's Brewery to be a community meeting place and hospitality offering. We'll have a small on-site brewery creating unique beers brewed with local ingredients served exclusively inside a 150 pax pub/ restaurant. Delicious local food will be prepared through an onsite kitchen and we're also anticipating being open for coffees and snacks from early in the morning.

The proposal has been a real hotbutton topic in the local area, with many concerned about the environmental impact and traffic generation of the development. We've worked closely with multiple ecologists, bushfire consultants, traffic consultants both from council and independently to find a way to build without the need for any wholesale clearing.

Our land is lucky to have hosted a winery in the distant past, and we inherited a large, cleared area, a rarity in Bucketty, that'll be used for the development.

Many of you may have read last

edition of the Community News depicting us as being dishonest and without regard for the local koala population that calls our land home. Please be assured that we are completely committed to safeguarding koalas. We have surveyed every koala feed tree surrounding the development and all are being retained. There's also a full management plan in place for both the construction and ongoing operation to ensure we're doing everything possible to be good neighbours to the wonderful local wildlife that occupies our property.

I'm yet to receive any direct contact from the anonymous author from last months article, or any member of the BAD brewery committee to discuss their concerns. However I'm readily available if anyone reading this would like to discuss on nick@buckettys. com au

We're hoping to build Bucketty's Brewery in what is currently a pretty isolated piece of country. Feedback we've received from the majority of residents is that they'd love to have a place to drop into for a sandwich, coffee or a fresh beer served directly from the tanks, looking over the incredible bushland of Bucketty. How good!

Hopefully we get the green light next month and you'll be one of the first to join us. Cheers!





## Bucketty Brewery & Co proposed development: It's not a little cafe!

If approved by Cessnock Council, Brookvale based Bucketty Brewery proposed Co's development & in Bucketty Private Road 5 will dramatically change the landscape of the Bucketty bush community. Already, and without evidence of having sought or been granted approval to do so, large scale clearing works and building of structures has been completed on the site. Many question, reasonably, whether this approach, one that might be described as arrogant and inconsiderate with regards to the landscape and history of Bucketty, is a foretaste of what is to come.

Since 2019, a large number of full and part time residents of Bucketty have fought against the proposal, lodging objections to council for both the first, and now the second DA application. These objections are based on concerns over noise, traffic, clearing of sensitive environment that is habitat to the densest population of koalas in the Cessnock LGA and other endangered species, disruption to other residents, and increased bushfire risk.

To be fair, there are those who don't object to the proposal. There is certainly



a (very) vocal minority who forcefully react to any voiced objections to the development. Unfortunately, on more than a few occasions their support for the proposal crosses into personal attacks against those objecting. I recognise these ad hominem 'arguments' for what they are; personal attacks against the character, motive, or other attribute of the person making an argument rather than the substance of the argument itself.

There are also a number of Buckettarianswhoareeitherambivalent about the proposed development, or lend it some support because "Having a cafe somewhere local to pop down to for a cuppa would be great'. I get that; I'm a regular at Laguna's Trading Post, Wollombi's Myrtle Cafe, and other existing local (OK...'local' being a relative term here) venues.

Here then is the substance of the argument against the proposed development: IT IS NOT A LITTLE CAFE.

FACT: the proposed development is for a 150 seat restaurant, pub, and attached micro-brewery. The majority of that seating capacity is planned to be outdoors. FACT: for reference, 150 seats is substantially larger than Laguna's Trading Post, and similar to



Wollombi Tavern. FACT: it is planned for there to be live music weekly at the venue which will be broadcast such that those seated outdoors can hear it. FACT: the development is planned to be open 7 days a week, to 10pm Friday and Saturday, and to 8pm all other nights. FACT: traffic along George Downes Drive approaches Private Road 5 in a signposted 80kp/h zone over a crest in both directions and visibility is therefore limited. Keep that in mind next time you're approaching Road 5 and see for yourself how much time you will have to react when you come over the crest to find a line of vehicles waiting to turn in, or coming out of Road 5. FACT: the 150 seat capacity and the economics of running that successfully dictate that vehicle traffic in and out of the venue will be significant. The principal of Bucketty Brewery & Co, Nick McDonald, has stated that he plans to bring coachloads of people in; keep that in mind too when you next drive by Road 5 and ask yourself just how those buses (and all the other heavy vehicles needed to supply the venue and remove rubbish) are going to turn in and out.

So then, to those who think that the proposal would be OK because a local cafe would be lovely; face facts, it is not a little cafe. To those whose natural reaction is to throw personal attacks when faced with objections; thank you for helping to make my point. As a near three decade owner and resident

On the spot it was difficult to fathom this objection, but now that I had had some time to think about the question, I would like to take this opportunity to tell how Scouting benefits the Mountain districts, and how by supporting only six mountain youth, we are in fact supporting a whole community.

Firstly I would like to say how proud I am of all the mountain youth that have come through our log cabin in the past fifteen years that I have been a leader here. A huge number of them have all filled service roles here on the mountain itself, more widely on the central coast and throughout the world. Many in nursing and community support, many teachers, one is training as a paramedic, another is a part of a tank task force in the Australian Defence force, one works in the NPWS, one recently has started with a local engineering firm and is travelling around Australia with the team, and many more in local employment. They have all worked locally, have all purchased their own cars, and all have jobs. 

"These new guidelines will provide advice and guidance to organisations on how to best strengthen youth participation in the volunteering sector, in particular tapping into the different skills they bring to encourage them to volunteer."

"What is exciting is that our young people are volunteering at fantastic rates – higher rates than ever, with 35 per cent of volunteers aged under 30. Seventy per cent of all people aged under 25 are engaging in some kind of volunteering activities."

In the bushlands of Mangrove Mountain, Kulnura, and the Watagans, Snives Hives is producing its natural, raw honey. This local business has gained recognition, including winning the Champion Commercial Honey award at the National Honey Competition during the Sydney Royal Easter Show. But Snives Hives is more than just a honey producer it's a vital player in protecting local bee populations and supporting the region's food production.

Every hive at Snives Hives has been rescued. Partnering with Sydney Bee Rescue, Snives Hives takes in colonies that would otherwise be exterminated. These rescued bees are relocated to the managed forests, where they thrive and produce high-quality honey. This approach not only saves bees but also supports the local environment by maintaining essential pollinators.

Recently, the arrival of an exotic bee pest, Varroa destructor, has posed a significant challenge. This parasite, which has devastated bee populations worldwide, has made its way to the region, threatening both wild and managed hives. The impact on unmanaged hives has been particularly severe, raising concerns about local food production and crop pollination.

For Snives Hives, the presence of Varroa destructor has meant intensifying efforts to protect its bees while maintaining the high standards that have earned its honey so much acclaim. Managing this pest is difficult and requires careful monitoring, innovative pest management techniques, and a deep understanding of bee health. The team at Snives Hives is dedicated to keeping their hives healthy without using chemicals that could compromise the purity of their honey.

This work is about more than

just honey production—it's about supporting the local food chain. Healthy bee populations are crucial for pollinating many crops, which in turn sustains the agricultural community. At the time of writing, their bees are sitting on stone fruit crops in Mangrove and Kulnura. By keeping their bees healthy and providing them to local farms, Snives Hives is playing a critical role in ensuring the continued availability of high-quality, chemicalfree honey and supporting local food production.

For residents of Mangrove Mountain and surrounding areas, Snives Hives' honey is more than a sweet treat. It reflects the care and commitment of a local business that values sustainability, community, and the environment. This commitment can be tasted in every jar of honey sold at the Mangrove Mountain Market, where Snives Hives has become a fixture.

At the Mangrove Mountain Market,

locals and visitors alike can find the Snives Hives stall, offering honey as pure as the bushland it comes from. The market has become an essential outlet for Snives Hives, connecting them directly with customers who appreciate the hard work behind every jar.



## Save lives by starting the conversation about organ donation

With approximately 1,800 people on Australia's organ transplant waitlist and 14,000 more on dialysis for kidney failure needing help, Coasties are being encouraged to consider organ donation and start conversations with their family about their decision.

With the celebration of Jersey Day last week, which aims to raise awareness of organ donation, encouraging people to wear a jersey and begin the conversation with their family and friends about the importance of becoming an organ and tissue donor, there is never a better time than now to start a conversation.

Jersey Day was inspired by the gift of life that Nathan Gremmo gave to six people, five young adults and a baby, when he became an organ donor at the age of 13.

Honouring the gift of life given by

Nathan Gremmo, Member for Gosford, Liesl Tesch MP encourages Coasties to go online and pledge to give the gift of life to those in need.

'Organ donation saves lives, and increasing awareness and consent is fundamental to lifting the donation rate. It's gut wrenching knowing that more than 50 Aussies passed away last year while on the organ transplant wait list."

Ms Tesch says that opportunities for transplants are being missed because families are uncertain about their loved one's wish to be a donor.

"I encourage people who are considering becoming an organ donor, or already are organ donors, to have conversations with their family and friends, letting them know of your wishes.

"Families are always asked to support someone's decision to be a donor before donation goes ahead. Families are much more likely to agree if their loved one is registered on the Australian Organ Donor Register, and their family knew they wanted to be a donor. It therefore so important that you begin the discussion today and not only register for organ donation, but begin the conversation with your family and friends."

Anyone aged 16 and over can register at donatelife.org.au to become an organ donor in just one minute, or with three taps in the Medicare app. People who think they may have already registered can perform an online check in just one minute.

Data shows that four in five Australians say they support donation, but only 36 per cent are registered.

"I urge our generous Coasties to please register as an organ and tissue donor. Just a minute of your time today can change so many lives in the future should the worst happen."

One organ donor can save the lives of up to 7 people and help many more through eye and tissue donation. For the seriously ill, an organ or tissue transplant can mean the difference between life and death, being healthy or sick, seeing or being blind.

In 2023, more than 47,000 people in NSW registered as an organ and tissue donor. There were 142 people in NSW who died and became organ donors, giving the gift of life to 392 transplant recipients.



- Attend our 'Get Ready' information session with Ourimbah RFS on 28 September, 10.30am-12.30pm, to gain practical tips in preparing for the upcoming bush fire season, and have an opportunity discuss their bush fire survival plans with RFS members. Find out more.
- Check out our online resources and guides that can help you to understand how bush fires and storms can affect you so, you can be better prepared to help protect your family, property and pets.

Council Administrator, Rik Hart said we know that severe weather and other emergency events will continue to be a part of our lives on the Central Coast, and these can occur at any moment.

"We are committed to keeping the community safe and are partnering with emergency services and key community organisations to raise awareness about emergency preparedness to assist members of the community," Mr Hart said.


