Re-Dedication of the Memorial Plaque at the Mangrove Mountain Union Church

On Sunday, October 17, 1920, a Gymea Lily provided a touch of the land the soldiers on the memorial plaque ploughed and tilled. The Union Jack Flag draped over the memorial was raised to proudly unveil the memorial tablet dedicated to the memory of First World War soldiers, Bombardier William Jamieson and Private Richard Hubert Le Gray.

Both men lived and worked their mountain land holdings prior to leaving Australia, their names on this memorial the only remaining evidence of their connection to Mangrove Mountain.

I am honoured to share a little about the life and service of both young service men of the Great War who called Mangrove Mountain home.

Private Charles Richard Hubert Le GRAY was born in Cootamundra, NSW, however, his Christian name 'Charles' is missing from his military papers. People around the district knew 'Dick' Le Gray as a most industrious young farmer.

Young men had been attracted to this district, several having relocated from Cootamundra, NSW, for example,

surnames like the Pinkstone brothers, Solling, Gates, Kelynack, and Le Gray to name a few. Since the early 1900s, news about farming at Mangrove Mountain spread through the Cootamundra newspaper articles; for example, 'ON OUR SELECTION'.

At Mangrove Mountain, Le Gray's 90-acre property consisted of 6 acres of citrus trees, a small dwelling that he and his mother, Edith Esme Lenore Le Gray shared until her death in June 1915, aged 51 years.

After his mother's death, Dick Le Gray aged 21 years 4 months, applied to enlist to fight for King and Country on October 17, 1916.

Dick's date of enlistment was only eight days before fellow farmer, William Jamieson, also enlisted; William being the other soldier named on the memorial plaque.

Dick was an unmarried farmer who was actively establishing his farm at Central Mangrove. With his mother deceased, 'Dick' noted his sister, Edith Ruby O'Neill of Unanderra, near Wollongong, NSW, as his next of kin. His physical height was 5 foot 11 inches, and he had a fair complexion with dark blue eyes and fair hair.

After enlisting Private Le Gray No. 6330 was posted to the 17th Battalion and trained at the Liverpool Military Camp before boarding A29 HMAT (His Majesty Australian Transport) 'SUEVIC' on November 10, 1916.

It is during the sea voyage that Dick Le Gray took ill with the measles, only a week into the voyage which lasted 2-3 weeks. Once the ship reached Cape Town, South Africa on 11 December 1916, Le Gray was transferred to the No. 2 General Hospital, and he died only 5

days later from bronchopneumonia.

Le Gray's burial in the Maitland Cemetery in Cape Town was on the same day as he had died - 16 December 1916.

Dick Le Gray's war medals were forwarded to his sister, Ruby, who had to prove that she was the closest living relative before she could receive the medals. Both Dick and Ruby's parents were deceased, and the only other brother, Louis Bertram Le Gray had lost touch with his siblings. Louis Bertram Le Gray was also a soldier in the 8th Infantry Battalion.

Ruby also received her brother's personal effects, which included a Leather purse, some cash, a chain, pipe, holdall, a Prayer Book, Safety Razor, one case, a letter case containing knife, fork and spoon, a box of cigarettes, one shell mirror, one wristlet watch, one money belt and some other personal belongings.

After his death, Dick Le Gray's 90acre Mangrove Mountain property was sold by public auction at the Gosford Courthouse on Wednesday May 15, 1918, to Alfred Ingram CHAPMAN,

Council's role in an emergency

Central Coast Council's role during a local emergency is to:

- Serve as a conduit for key information on the emergency event from the Emergency Service Providers for example; State Emergency Service, Fire and Rescue, Rural Fire Service, Police Force, Health, etc.
- Support the lead Emergency Service Provider with the resources, people and equipment they need to manage the emergency and any follow-up recovery actions (as per legislative requirements of the Central Coast Local Emergency Management Plan (EMPLAN 2023)
- Continue our constant and close monitoring of Council managed open spaces, reserves, facilities and roads for any impacts.
- Mobilise our own resources, people and equipment to respond to any identified impacts.
- Provide key information to the community and relevant stakeholders about how Council's services or facilities are impacted such as Water and Sewer Services, Waste Collection and availability of Child Care Centres, Libraries and Community Halls.
- Drive community-led approaches to coping with the emergency.

Council works closely with the Local Emergency Management Committee (LEMC) to ensure that all aspects of Emergency Prevention, Preparedness, Response, and Recovery are well supported and resourced.

Following a natural disaster, a Local Recovery Committee is led by Council, working with NSW Government and other state agencies to provide cohesive support in the recovery and clean up phase. This includes offering face-to-face recovery support and information to impacted residents at recovery assistance points (recovery hubs) and through various other channels.

Central Coast Council's priority during an emergency:

Emergency events are a quick changing situation and Council's focus is on community safety and distributing key information as quickly as possible.

Council works closely with the

NSW Rural Fire Service throughout the bush fire season and during period of increased bush fire activity and emergency situations, NSW SES and other emergency service providers during storm and flood events, and emergency events.

During an emergency event, Council constantly monitors Council managed reserves and open spaces, facilities, and roads for any impacts, whilst mobilising crews on the ground as required.

Council's communication channels during an emergency:

During an emergency event, Council will regularly post on Council's Facebook and Twitter social media pages with important news on the impacts to Council facilities, services, assets and managed public spaces, and shares key information on the emergency event from the leading Emergency Service Providers (for example the SES and RFS).

Key information is also posted on Council's website and included in our weekly eNewsletter (sign up to eNews), in addition to other communication channels such as print advertising, community brochures, and through local media such as ABC Central Coast (as the local emergency broadcaster).

Emergency Operations Centre (EOC):

The Central Coast Emergency Operations Centre (EOC) may be activated (or stood up) during an emergency event at the discretion of the Local Emergency Operations Controller (LEOCON) who is the local Commander of the NSW Police Force.

If the EOC is activated during an Emergency event, Council will:

- Ensure that the EOC is functional and adequately resourced to support an emergency response.
- Provide a Local Emergency Management Officer (LEMO) to support coordination of the emergency response, a Liaison Officer (LO) to act as a conduit between the EOC and Council's Incident Management Team (IMT), and provide other support staff such as communications officers, technicians, administration staff, and subject matter experts.

William Arthur CHAPMAN and their father, William John CHAPMAN.

Private William James Jamieson was born on the Shetland Islands, the youngest son of Fraser and Catherine Jamieson,(nee Bryden Dalziel). He was a brother to five siblings (two sisters and three brothers). William's mother died in 1908.

William emigrated to Australia and settled at Mangrove Mountain. His brother John was also in the country, living with extended Jamieson family members in Eidsvold, Queensland.

William was an orchardist, his property known as 'Trenton', Mangrove Mountain.

Just shy of his 31st birthday, William applied to enlist on 24 October 1916, joining the ranks of the 1st Australian Infantry Battalion, 6th Reinforcements, Light Trench Mortar Battery, his Service No.1969.

William records his next-of-kin details as his father, Fraser of Shetland, Scotland and notates please advise his surrogate mother in Australia, Mrs Emma White of Forest View, Mangrove Mountain.

Boarding the 'Osterley' at Sydney on February 10, 1917, the journey would take two-months until reaching Plymouth, England. At the Windmill Hill Camp, Perham Downs, Wiltshire, William received instruction in the 16th Brigade Signalling School.

After a short period with the 62nd Battalion and prior to his deployment to Northern France and Flanders, William was transferred for the further instruction with the 1st Tunnelling Battalion, later returning to the 1st Australian Infantry Battalion.

On January 8, 1918, William proceeded overseas to rejoin the 1st Australian Battalion, where the soldiers over the next couple of months

would experience a mix of light to heavy snow, overcast, at times sunny conditions, and mostly very cold and wet weather patterns.

The Battle of Lys commenced on April 9, 1918, and was part of the offensive known as the Spring Offensive.

On April 13, 1918, the First Australian Division played a key role in halting the German advance towards Hazebrouck, during the Battle of the Lys, (Lee-se), and it was during this Flanders battle that William was wounded in action receiving gunshot wounds to the back of his legs and lower back region.

William was evacuated from the field and transported to the No. 7 Stationary Hospital at Boulogne, a port town on the French coastline.

Four days after his hospitalisation, on 17 October 1918, at the age of 32 years, the Scottish born, blue-eyed, brown-haired farmer, who had made Mangrove Mountain his home, died from the wounds he had received in action. William was buried at the Boulogne Eastern Cemetery.

William Jamieson's military documents provide evidence suggest why this memorial was placed here at the Mangrove Mountain Union Church.

George Martin White and his mother, Emma White of 'Forest View', Mangrove Mountain, were very close

friends of William's; in fact, George looked after William's orchard and property 'Trenton' while he was on active service.

On behalf of his mother, Emma, George wrote to the military department requesting information about his friend's death, and if they could provide further details about the battle he fought.

A passage of the letter reads:

I am desirous of placing something to his (William's) memory in the Church, and although he was not my kin, I loved him as a son and was as a mother to him since he had been in the colonies - his own mother being dead.

It is wonderful to see the same caring and compassionate community, now one hundred and five years later, honouring these two men of the First World War and the community of people for whom these men meant a great deal for their selfless service.

William's last will and Testament lists his father, Fraser, his siblings Jemima, Robina, James, and Fraser inr. of Shetland, Scotland, and his brother John who was living with extended family at Eidsvold, in Queensland as beneficiaries of his estate.



ESCAPED BURNS SPARK WARNING ON SAFE BURNING PRACTICES

The RFS is reminding landholders to follow safe burning practices and ensure they notify their local fire authority and neighbours, after 30 escaped burns were reported across NSW in April - including a dozen over the Easter long weekend.

Although the Bush Fire Danger Period has ended, landholders are still required to notify their intent to burn and ensure they check local weather conditions before undertaking any burning activity. The RFS provides an online notification portal, enabling residents to easily inform fire authorities of planned hazard reduction or pile burns at any time, via mobile device or desktop computer.

Commissioner of the RFS Rob Rogers said using the notification tool at www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify plays a key role in preventing unnecessary emergency responses.

"Over the coming months, many landholders will take the opportunity to reduce fuel loads through burning. It's critical they burn safely and notify both the RFS and their neighbours," Commissioner Rogers said.

"Even when the official Bush Fire Danger Period has ended, landholders must ensure they've obtained any required permits and permissions and provide at least 24 hours' notice before lighting up."

"If fire authorities are aware of your burn, it helps prevent unnecessary emergency calls and the deployment of firefighting resources."

The online notification tool also provides notifications about any Total Fire Bans, helping landholders make informed decisions about whether to proceed with their planned burn.


Commissioner of the RFS Rob Rogers stressed that while reducing fuel on private properties is encouraged, it must always be done safely and legally.

"Before lighting any fire, landholders should check local conditions and ensure they have cleared adequate fire breaks and have firefighting equipment on hand to prevent the fire from escaping," Commissioner Rogers said.

"Every landholder has a responsibility to prevent fire spreading from their property. There are serious consequences for those who light fires and fail to manage them properly."

Notice of 1080 Baiting

NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) is conducting an aerial baiting program in Popran, Brisbane Water and Watagans National Park.

Aerial baiting is scheduled for 11th to 18th May 2025.

The operation will use 1080 (sodium fluoroacetate) poison for the control of wild dogs and foxes.

The program is designed to minimise predator impacts on wildlife, especially threatened species, and to minimise the impact of wild dogs on neighbouring stock. Signs will be placed at the entry to the baiting location.



Domestic pets are not permitted in National Parks and Wildlife managed lands. Pets and working dogs may be affected (1080 is lethal to cats and dogs). Pets and working dogs must be restrained or muzzled in the vicinity and

must not enter the baiting location. In the event of accidental poisoning seek immediate veterinary assistance.

All NSW public schools on a path to full and fair funding

The Albanese and Minns Labor Governments have reached an Agreement to fully and fairly fund New South Wales public schools.

As part of the Heads of Agreements signed this week, the Commonwealth will provide an additional 5 per cent of the Schooling Resource Standard (SRS) to New South Wales.

This will lift the Commonwealth contribution from 20 per cent to 25 per cent of the SRS by 2034 and follows New South Wales delivering its election commitment to reach 75 per cent of the SRS in 2025, two years ahead of the former Liberal National Government.

This will see an estimated \$4.8 billion in additional Commonwealth funding to New South Wales public schools over the next 10 years.

This represents the biggest ever

new investment in New South Wales public schools by the Australian Government.

New South Wales has also committed to removing the 4 per cent provision of indirect school costs such as capital depreciation so that New South Wales schools will be fully funded over the life of the Agreement.

Commonwealth funding will be tied to the reforms needed to lift education standards across the country, including more individualised support for students, continuing evidence-based teaching practices, and more mental health and wellbeing support for schools.

This is not a blank cheque. The Agreement will be accompanied by a New South Wales Bilateral Agreement, which ties funding to reforms that will help students catch up, keep up and finish school, such as:

- Year 1 phonics and early years of schooling numeracy checks to identify students who need additional help;
- evidence-based teaching and targeted and intensive supports such as small-group or catch-up tutoring to help students who fall behind;
- initiatives that support wellbeing for learning – including greater access to mental health professionals;
- access to high-quality and evidence-

based professional learning, and

• initiatives that improve the attraction and retention of teachers.

In addition to these reforms, the Agreements have national targets that complement the New South Wales Government's own public school targets released last week.

National targets include:

- Improving NAPLAN proficiency levels for reading and numeracy across all year levels;
- Increasing the outcomes for priority equity cohorts in NAPLAN results;
- Increasing the Student Attendance Rate;
- Increasing the engagement rate (completed or still enrolled) of initial teacher education students; and
- Increasing the proportion of students leaving school with a Year 12 certificate.

This means more help for students and more support for teachers.

Federal Member for Robertson, Dr Gordon Reid MP said "Quality public education changes is life changing and opens doors to marvellous opportunities.

"The Australian Government has reached an outstanding agreement with the NSW Government to fully

On behalf of Dad, Paul, and the entire Luci Family, we would like to thank the Mountain Community for their outpouring of love, support and words of condolences, after the recent passing of our Mother, Mary.

We celebrated Mums' life with many of you at a Holy Mass on Monday 14th April, at St Patrick's Catholic Church, East Gosford. We were overwhelmed to find the church full of people keen to be a part of celebrating the life of our Mum. A true testament to the wonderful legacy of a life, so well lived, and thoroughly enjoyed.

Mum was born on 29th June 1955 at St George Hospital in Kogarah. Mary was the eldest Daughter of Rafaele and Teresa Spano. Mum leaves behind her Mother, Teresa, and four Siblings, Lena, Michael, John and Anthony.

Her family grew up in Miranda in the Sutherland Shire. They lived in a share house for a short period with her Uncle Joe and his wife and Children until they moved to their own house in Miranda. Their Nonna Concetta looked after all the Grandchildren from both families while all the parents went to work

Mum went to school at the age of 5 not being able to speak English, only Italian. She spoke about the challenges of school and how she spent many days crying in kindergarten. She spoke fondly of the year 6 girls who took her under their care and looked after her. Mum quickly learnt English and would translate letters, bills and correspondence for her parents and family members.

Mum spoke about her happy childhood in a big family, going to the movies with her dad on the back of the push bike or driving around in her mini with Nonna Concetta in the passenger seat. She had saved up her own money to buy this first car so they could cruise out to Cronulla Beach.

Our Mum and Dad met on her Aunty and Uncles Farm at Kulnura at the end of 1974. They married in January 1976. They began their married life chicken farming at Kulnura opposite what is now Hanson Quarry. Mum often spoke about being a city girl and moving to Country. Mum would help Dad out on the farm with the chickens as well as fitting in her other duties as newly married couple. This then followed on

with her love and connections to the local Mountain Community.





Weeds of Concern

Montbretia

Crocosmia x crocosmiiflora

How does this weed affect you? Montbretia grows in dense clumps and is capable of adapting to a variety of conditions. It out-competes native plants, particularly in native bushland and riparian areas. The biodiversity of ecosystems can be significantly affected by an infestation of montbretia. Dense growth of this plant along riparian areas can lead to creek bank erosion and sedimentation.

Montbretia can sometimes still be found for sale at local fetes, nurseries and markets.

Habit: Erect deciduous perennial herb to 0.9 m.

Leaves: Basal linear strap-like flat leaves around 30-80 cm long and 1-2 cm wide die down in Autumn after producing its seeds, and reappear in Spring.





Flowers: Orange yellow tubular flowers are formed solitary in spike inflorescences on short wispy



unbranched stems during Summer.

Fruit: Produces large amounts of seed

Roots: Globular corms live and produce plants for 2 years or more, and new corms are formed annually. Long rhizomes are also produced, each of which grows into a new plant.

Dispersal: Roots, rhizomes, corms and seeds spread by humans, contaminated soil (earth moving equipment, car tyres etc) and garden refuse dumping.

Control: Difficult to control. Hand dig, ensuring all corms are removed.

Extensive follow-up required. Foliar spray with penetrant when flowering.




