DRAFT REVISED OPEN PILE BURNING POLICY RELEASED FOR COMMENT

The Central Coast Council Draft Open Pile Burning Policy is on public exhibition for your feedback.

The draft policy states "The objective of the Open Pile Burning Policy (Policy) is to enable the burning of dead and dry vegetation for the purposes of maintaining rural residential properties in a way that is safe and poses minimal risk to the environment and public health.

The key changes are:

- 4.17 Burning must only be undertaken between the hours of 7am and 10pm.
- 4.18 All fires must be completely extinguished between the hours of 10pm and 7am.
- 4.23. To protect native habitats, the clearing of vegetation - including burning woody debris that supports native wildlife - is not permitted under this Policy

The proposed changes could make it more difficult for residents in rural areas to manage their properties to reduce bushfire hazard.

Clause 4.17 and 4.18 will remove the opportunity to light fires when conditions are ideal purely due to nightfall. There are times when nightfall brings cooler conditions with increased humidity thereby reducing risks.

Clause 4.23 seems contrary to the need to reduce the on-ground combustible fuel load. Most rural residents will, to some extent clear dead woody debris with the aim to reduce the fire hazard to property, livestock and persons.

The council website lists other changes but these requirements are already in place in the 2020 Open Pile Burn Policy



HOUSING, JOBS & ENVIRONMENT: STRATEGIC DEVELOPMENT PLANS FOR THE CENTRAL COAST

The New South Wales Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure has released the draft Central Coast Strategic Conservation Plan (CCSCP) for public exhibition, from 30 September until 5:00 pm on 11 November 2025.

The CCSCP is an integral component of the broader Central Coast Regional Plan 2041 (CCRP) which is a comprehensive 20-year vision that guides the sustainable growth and development of the Central Coast Local Government Area (LGA).

The CCRP is prepared under the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979 (EP&A Act).

The CCRP was updated in 2022 following a review that involved extensive community consultation and engagement with stakeholders.

This update represents the first five-yearly review cycle, designed to safeguard the long-term prosperity and wellbeing of the Central Coast region and to support vibrant, resilient, and connected communities for the next two decades, responding new challenges such as technological advancements, demographic change, and shifting economic conditions.



In light of the COVID-19 pandemic and its lasting impact on how people live and work, the CCRP gives priority to the creation of a sustainable "15-minute region"—a network of neighbourhoods where residents can conveniently access daily amenities, services, and employment opportunities within a short walk or bike ride, or, in rural contexts, via a brief car journey.

This model encourages active lifestyles, greater use of public transport and reduced car dependency.

At its core, the plan aims to reinforce connections between people and the Central Coast's unique natural environment, increasing access to parks, green and blue public spaces, and seamlessly integrating nature into everyday urban life to boost liveability for all residents.

A Six Cities Regional Perspective

The NSW Government has adopted a "Six Cities" regional approach centred on Greater Sydney, shaping the broader region's development trajectory.

This network comprises: Lower Hunter and Greater Newcastle City, Central Coast City, Illawarra-Shoalhaven City, Western Parkland City, Central River City, and Eastern Harbour City.

Within this framework, the Central Coast City is positioned as an innovation district, leveraging both established and emerging areas of expertise to deliver globally significant solutions and integrate into a wider innovation network spanning these cities.

The Urban Development Program:

The CCRP implements an urban development program to manage land and housing supply and to coordinate the delivery of supporting infrastructure.

This program is underpinned by an audit process that collates data from local councils, infrastructure providers, and industry stakeholders.

This approach enables the

identification of land suitable for immediate and future growth, areas warranting further investigation and land that is already zoned and serviced for new homes and employment precincts.

Conversely, the program also highlights land unsuitable for development.

Central Coast Strategic Conservation Plan (CCSCP)

The CCSCP is a pivotal next step in the delivery of the CCRP, designed to unlock new development opportunities in priority precincts such as Somersby, Greater Warnervale, and Greater Lake Munmorah.

The plan introduces a new framework for land categorisation:

- CCSCP precincts
- Certified urban capable land
- · Non-certified

Certified urban capable land: These areas, totalling approximately 1,862 hectares, will receive upfront biodiversity approvals from State and Federal authorities. Landowners wishing to develop will not be required to seek individual biodiversity permits, expediting the planning process.

Non-certified land: Covering roughly 1,207 hectares, these precinct areas are deemed unsuitable for more intensive development. While existing uses can continue, additional clearing of native vegetation will be restricted.

Coordination and Planning Strategies

Together, the Central Coast Regional Plan, the CCSCP, and accompanying planning documents comprise a comprehensive suite of frameworks that collectively address the multifaceted requirements for appropriate, community-focused, and environmentally sensitive development in the region. A coordinated approach is assured through the efficient use of current infrastructure and strategic planning for future expansion, ensuring that growth aligns with changing

population needs and community expectations.

Key objectives include:

- housing that suits all kinds of people
- improving roads and buildings we already have
- better access to places people walk and ride
- more places for sport
- · more car parking
- better public transport
- making sure there are enough health care services for everyone
- · accessible community spaces.

Community Input, Oversight and Measured Outcomes

The CCSCP references a 30-year timeline, extending well beyond the 20-year period outlined by the CCRP.

It is vital that residents and stakeholders are given a meaningful opportunity to review and contribute.

Giventhecomplexityandsignificance of these planning documents, the public consultation period should be extended to a minimum of six months to facilitate informed, thoughtful participation and feedback.

While the plans' ambitions to support economic development, housing growth, and environmental protection, including further expansion of the Central Coast Open Space System (COSS), are welcomed, it remains critical that mechanisms for ongoing community input, independent oversight, and rigorous evaluation of progress are formalised.

Long-term success depends not only on well-crafted strategies but also on transparency, continual measurement, public accountability, avoidance of exploitation and adaptability.

Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal

Public Hearing into Central Coast Council's prices for water, wastewater and other services

IPART is reviewing the maximum prices that Central Coast Council can charge for its water and wastewater services (excluding stormwater) from 1 July 2026.

IPART has released an Issues Paper seeking community feedback on the council's pricing proposal, which is published on IPART's website.

Tribunal Chair Carmel Donnelly said, "We are keen to hear what residents, businesses and stakeholders think about the proposed prices, including feedback on affordability, value for money, quality of services and how well customers have been consulted by Central Coast Council on its pricing proposal."

Central Coast Council has proposed prices that would increase the annual bill for a typical household by 8.0% in the first year (plus inflation), followed by annual increases for inflation only in each of the following 4 years. IPART will assess whether the proposed prices are justified so that customers pay only what the council needs to efficiently deliver its services to customers.

"We will carefully consider the impacts of the pricing proposal on household budgets, service standards, the environment, and the economy more broadly, as well as what an efficient water business would need to deliver safe, reliable, quality water services. Our review will include examining how Central Coast Council proposes to invest in and maintain critical infrastructure, so customer and community expectations are met efficiently," said Ms Donnelly.

Ms Donnelly encouraged customers and the community to provide feedback

on the pricing proposal by making a submission to our Issues Paper or completing our Have Your Say survey by 28 November 2025. Stakeholders can also register on our website to attend the online public hearing on 20 November 2025.

IPART will consider all comments made through submissions, survey responses, and at the public hearing before releasing a Draft Report seeking further community feedback in early March 2026.

Crews Battle two Local Bushfires

Reports from Kariong and Copabana RFS - An illegal pile burn at a nearby property on October 25 led to a bushfire at Lackersteen Rd, Somersby.

Around 40 crews from NSW RFS and Fire & Rescue NSW fought through the night to contain the blaze whilst NSW Police were required to control the traffic along Peats Ridge Road.

a fire at Bar Point on the Hawkesbury River.

Working in tough terrain and limited access, our team was able to contain the fire and protect nearby properties.

A big thanks to our dedicated volunteers who always answer the call - day or night.

As we are now in the declared bushfire danger period, no fires are allowed without a permit.

Getting a permit is free and easy. If your property is in a Rural Fire District, you can apply for a permit online from the RFS.



CB Radio Emergency Communications Network User Guides



Towards the end of 2021 the Mangrove Emergency Planning and Communications Committee began to develop and subsequently rolled out a CB Radio Emergency Communications Network using a grant awarded under the Commonwealth Black Summer Bushfire Recovery program.

As part of this network there were two documents developed, the "Guide for Training and Use" and the "Quick Reference Guide".

Several training and information sessions were held and these documents were issued to all attendees.

Guide for Training and Use

The Guide for Training and Use is a 32 page document that covers the basic and advanced use of the Base Station GME TX4500S, the two handhelds - GME TX6160XY and GME TX6600S as well as the GME XRS-370C and XRS-390C units fitted to vehicles.

It also address procedures such as:

- * Safety
- * Maintenance
- * Redundancy, Reliability & Technical Issues
- * The CB Radio System and Equipment
- * Common channel designations (by

law/convention)

- * Squelch
- * Silent & Quiet Modes
- * Keypad Functions
- * Backup Battery and Power Supply
- * Priority Channel
- * Listening and Speaking
- * Basic Rules and Preparing to Speak
- * Basic protocols for exercising good radio communications
- * Key phrases to remember
- * Phonetic Alphabet

Quick Reference Guide

The Quick Reference Guide is a four page set of laminated sheets and is meant to be kept close to the CB Radio.

Being laminated, participants can write key details related to the property such as:

- * Location details
- * 3 Words reference
- * RFS Mapping Grid Reference
- * Call sign
- * Selcall Number
- * Important phone numbers
- * Specific site directions
- * Any other information that would help during the pressure of an emergency.

It can also be used as a scribble pad to take notes during communications.

User Guide Distribution

For those who were unable to attend any of the sessions and have not received these documents, arrangements are being made for a MEPCC representative to hold distribution sessions so these documents can be issued to participants. It is planned to hold sessions at the Tree at Spencer and Mangrove Mountain Markets with dates to be advised.

Cycling the Batteries on CB's

Whether a base station or handheld, it is important to cycle the batteries. This is done by letting the batteries partly drain and then charged. For the base station this is done by leaving the CB on for two to three days but the power switched off at the powerpoint and for handhelds, keep the unit on for a day but not plugged in to a charger.

It is also recommended that the battery box for the base stations be opened and the terminals checked for corrosion.

Cerebral Palsy and other disabilities to empower them to challenge themselves.



Bitten By A King Brown

For the very first time, Australian Reptile Park, Manager Billy Collett, has finally answered the question he's been asked for years, have you been bitten? Billy finally opened up about the most terrifying moment of his life almost 10 years later... the day he was bitten by a King Brown snake in

The beloved wildlife presenter and park manager, known for his passion for animals and dedication to the antivenom program, has worked hands-on with venomous snakes for over 20 years. Highly skilled and trained in the delicate process of safely milking snakes, Billy has now shared his harrowing near-death experience on his new YouTube series, Venom Diaries (https://www.youtube.com/ watch?v=96vTWNGsFvE&t=1s), which gives audiences a behind-thescenes look at the daily life of working inside the Park's Weigel Venom Centre.

While examining a King Brown snake recovering from surgery, Billy was caught off guard when the reptile thrashed unexpectedly. It latched onto his wrist and began chewing, a typical behaviour for the species. Due to his extensive experience with venomous

snakes, and countless drills on this exact senario, Billy managed to remain calm under pressure. As per protocol, Billy safely secured the snake back in its enclosure before applying lifesaving first aid to himself.

Moments later, the venom began to take hold.

"Within about 5 minutes I could feel symptoms. My eyesight was strained, I had a really bad taste in my mouth, I felt extremely nauseous, I was sweating so bad," Billy recalls.

But the nightmare had only just begun. When doctors administered

antivenom, Billy suffered a severe allergic reaction, his body swelling and breaking out in hives. The snake that bit him had recently broken the world record for the largest venom yield from a snake, making the situation even more dire.

"I was freaking out, I honestly thought I was gonna die," Billy said.

Up against the clock, doctors carefully stabilised Billy, slowly administering antivenom over an extended period until the venom was neutralised. Remarkably, the week after, Billy was back at the Australian

"I've stayed quiet for years but am finally ready to tell my story." Billy said. "People ask me why I still do this, but it's not a hero thing, the antivenom program just saves so many lives in Australia each year and I'm so proud of that. I'll do this as long as I can," Billy said. "the bite definitely plays in the back of my mind, and I never ever want to go through that again."

Today, Billy is stronger than ever,

still working hands-on with the world's deadliest snakes to produce antivenom that saves hundreds of Australians each year.

With warmer weather ahead and snake season approaching, Billy and the Australian Reptile Park are urging Australians to refresh their knowledge of first aid in case of a snake bite:

- 1. Stay calm.
- 2. Remove any jewellery from the affected limb.
- 3. Apply a pressure bandage: wrap

- firmly around the bite site 3 times, then continue bandaging up the entire limb.
- 4. Call 000 immediately and keep as still as possible until help arrives.

"First aid is everything," Billy stresses. "If you're bitten by a snake, the very first step before anything else is to apply a bandage. It's what saves lives."

About the Antivenom Program:

Since the 1950s, the Australian Reptile Park has been the sole suppliers of terrestrial snake venom for the purpose of making anti-venom with CSL Segirus. It is estimated that 300 lives are saved by anti-venom in Australia each year and since the program's inception, over 25,000 Australian lives have been saved by the program. The Australian Reptile Park is currently home to over 200 venomous snakes that are a part of the venom program that are milked on a fortnightly basis in the state-of-the-art Weigel Venom Centre.



Rural Aid - what is it and how can it help?

On the 2nd of November members of our community met with David Thiele, a coordinator with Rural Aid.

Rural Aid had been approached by Breanna Pollock, the Central Coast Council Emergency Management Coordinator, to review the needs of our farming community with the view to determine if a suitable support program could be offered to farmers in the Mountains District.

How Rural Aid Helps

Rural Aid Coordinators organise teams of volunteers to carry out tasks to assist farmers. There are a vast range of tasks that can be accommodated including fencing, cleaning debris, mustering, yard work, spraying, gardening, vegetation clearing, repairing buildings & equipment, small scale construction, sowing, operating machinery eg tractors & excavators, repair & install irrigation lines, road repairs, farm house repairs, Counselling and Wellbeing, Financial Assistance, Fodder, Rural Transition Services, Educational Resources and

Rural Aid Coordinators check the requirements of the farmers and the facilities available and prepare a work program.

Teams consist of about 20 to 40 volunteers who come from all over the country.

Volunteers are mostly self sufficient, having their own vehicles and caravans or tents. Rural Aid provides food but a suitable location is required to set up a base, reasonably close to the work areas, that is fairly level with access to toilets, showers, power and water.


The teams work in properties in the designated area for 5 working days, arriving on the preceding weekend and departing on the following weekend.

A Farmers Story

In 2011, the northern Victorian town of Kerang experienced what locals were told was a 'once-in-100-year' flood. Fast forward just 11 years

to October 2022, and they found themselves bracing for the Loddon River to break its banks again.

Despite improved infrastructure and a hastily erected levee, much of the region was hit even harder than the decade prior, with properties like Dale Trevorrow's sustaining significant damage.

Flood debris, damaged fencing, and eradicated channels were all by-products of the inundation, with cash flow from Dale's cattle farming and cropping essentially wiped out by the disaster event too.

With damages mounting and income ground to a halt, Dale found his mental health and resolve to carry on deteriorating.

"It plays on your mind when you've got so much to do. It really does affect your mental health," said Dale.

In May 2023, 22 Rural Aid volunteers travelled to Kerang to assist six different properties with recovery and rebuilding efforts. The experience was not just beneficial for farmers fighting to recover, but for the volunteers as



Feedback sought on proposed memorials and roadside tributes policies

Central Coast Council is inviting the community to share their thoughts on two draft policies, the Memorials in Public Places Policy and the Roadside Tributes Policy which are public exhibition. These policies have been developed in response to growing community interest in memorials and tributes, while also ensuring that public spaces and roads remain safe and accessible for all.

Each policy apples to a different setting. The Memorials in Public Places Policy relates to memorials in parks, reserves and other public spaces, while the Roadside Tributes Policy provides guidance for tributes placed at the site of fatal road incidents on Council-managed roads.

The Memorials in Public Places Policy offers options for commemorative tree plantings in parks and reserves, including community memorial trees with plaques and natural tree plantings with optional certificates of recognition.

Council Director Community and Recreation Services, Melanie Smith said the policy was designed to support grieving families while ensuring public spaces remain safe and accessible for everyone.

The Roadside Tributes Policy introduces guidelines for the duration of tributes and a voluntary registration process to help Council stay in touch with families if future roadworks or changes are needed in the area.

Both draft policies are available for public comment until 5 December 2025
